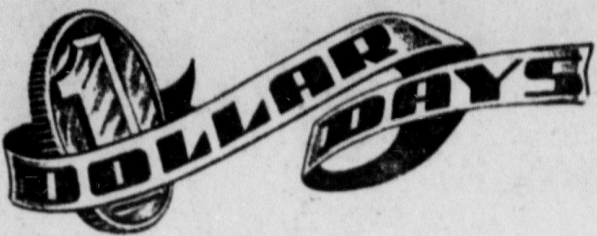

its Centre County appearance on Saturday, September 24. Concerts are scheduled to be given in the afternoon and evening.
The engagement resulted when Mr. Cappel, who has been in correspondence with Mr. Holter for some time, wrote to the Howard band leader stating that the band is planning a tour next September, and that September 24 was an open date. Mr. Holter immediately accepted the offer by telegram.
Although no definite arrangements have been made for the concerts to be given locally, Mr. Holter reports that they will probably be held either in Bellefonte, State College, or Hecla Park. The afternoon performance may be held in one community and the evening concert in another, so that all residents of the County will have an opportunity to attend with a minimum of traveling. It is the hope to have all the county's school children hear the band free of charge.
The acceptance by Mr. Holter of the open date was a great satisfaction to the County and the Marine Band will play in no other nearby county during the tour.
The band, consisting of more than 60 pieces, travels in its own busses, and persons who heard the organization at a concert at Bucknell University last year were delighted with the program and with the appearance of the colorful musical unit.
Centre County has long been known for its famous local bands, and for its higher-than-average number of musicians. For these reasons it is believed that the appearance of the Marine Band here will prove to be a major attraction during the coming summer season.

Court, as scheduled, and has issued the order continuing it until the next regular session of court in May.
The three cases listed for trial in March were:
A. H. Hartwick, now for use of C. I. T. Corporation of New York vs. Surl C. Hartwick, Executor, of the last will and testament of A. H. Hartwick, deceased; assumpsit, no affidavit of defense filed.
Wilson Miller, vs. Curtin township, Toner Mann, Harvey Weaver, Lloyd Yeager, road supervisor; trespass. No affidavit of defense filed.
James R. Hughes vs. James Shirk, assumpsit, affidavit of defense filed.
The Hartwick case was continued upon mutual agreement of counsel for the defendant and for the plaintiff.
The Miller case could not come up for trial since Judge Walker was interested in the matter as an attorney before his elevation to the Bench.
The amount involved in the Hughes-Shirk case is not greatly in excess of the cost of bringing a panel of jurors into court. This case is the only one directly affected by the postponement of the February Civil Court, since the other two would not have gone to trial in any event.

FIRE RAZES HOME AT VALLEY VIEW

ment, and the Undine Company's Ford truck was sent to the scene. By the time they arrived at the home, the upper part of the frame house was enveloped in flames.
The only available water supplies were cisterns and small reservoirs, none of which could be reached to provide the fire apparatus with sufficient water to fight the flames. Shortly after the arrival of the firemen from the roof of the home of County Commissioner Paul N. Eckley, across the road, was found to be on fire in a dozen or so places where sparks from the Houser fire had fallen. Fanned by a high wind these sparks soon threatened the Eckley home, but firemen quickly extended a booster line to the roof, and carried water from the Eckley reservoir to provide the pumper with sufficient water to keep the roof wet and to quench the sparks as they fell.
At the outset of the fire, Mrs. Houser and her sister were alone in the house. Mr. Houser being at the nearby Eckley store and two children being in school. Before firemen arrived Mr. Houser, assisted by neighbors, was able to carry practically all the first floor furniture, and a few items of household goods from the second floor to a place of safety.
At the height of the fire, the intense heat for a time threatened to ignite a frame garage just west of the Houser home. Carrying pans and buckets of water procured from cisterns, firemen kept the garage roof and walls soaked and prevented its destruction.
When the flames were at their peak the crowd which had gathered at the scene were startled by a series of reports within the blazing structure. Mr. Houser explained that the machine gun-like explosions were caused by a number of shotgun shells he had in his home.
Firemen remained on the scene until the home had cooled in and until the blaze had burned itself out. The building is a total loss. Mr. Houser reported that he carried some insurance on both the building and household goods, but expressed the belief that the insurance would not completely cover the loss.
