

BUILDING PROGRAM TO BEGIN

Penn State Will Break Ground For Buildings

Governor Earle, Senator Guylfe Among Speakers, Saturday Afternoon Ceremony To Be Broadcast Over Eight Stations

The General State Authority's \$5,000,000 building program at the Pennsylvania State College will be formally launched at ground-breaking ceremonies at the College Saturday afternoon, with Governor George H. Earle, U. S. Senator Joseph F. Guffey, and other high state and federal officials in attendance.

Thousands of persons—prominent individuals from all parts of the state, alumni and friends of the College, faculty members, students and residents of Central Pennsylvania—are expected to attend the ceremonies.

Radio will carry a description of the ground-breaking to many thousands more in the eastern United States who cannot attend the actual ceremony on the campus. Headed by KDKA, Pittsburgh, and WCA (Continued on page six)

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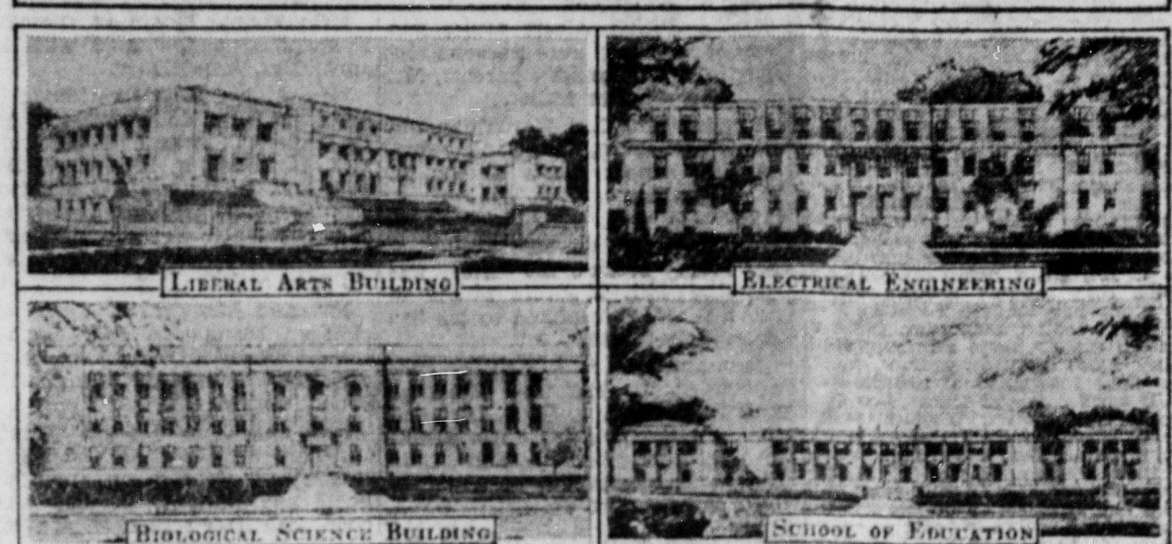
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Council To Consider New Set of Traffic Laws; Enforcing Ordinance

Belleville Borough Council at a regular meeting in the Logan House Monday night revived the traffic question and unanimously passed a motion calling for the drawing of new traffic regulations and for an accompanying ordinance for the enforcement of the new code. It is possible that parking meters, which dispense parking rights at the rate of five cents for a half-hour, may be installed in the vicinity of the Diamond to insure adequate parking space for persons who wish to stop only long enough to make purchases in the business district. It is also possible that the two-hour parking limit in the entire business district will be continued and will be enforced under the provisions of the proposed traffic ordinance.

HERE are four of the ten major buildings which will be constructed at the Pennsylvania State College by the General State Authority. The building program, largest in the history of the College, will be inaugurated at ground-breaking ceremonies at the College Saturday, Feb. 26. The celebration, which will include speeches by Governor George H. Earle and President Ralph D. Hetzel of the College, will be broadcast over the major radio stations of the state. A large number of state and national officials are expected to attend.

Judge Walker Bases Sentence on Reports of Psychiatrists; Asks Officers to Cease Pyramiding Charges; Many Pleas Disposed of at Special Session, Thursday

Glyde V. Myers, 19-year-old Pennsylvania State College junior who pleaded guilty to one of seven charges of larceny against him in Court here last Thursday morning, was sentenced by Judge Ivan Walker to serve an indeterminate sentence in the State Industrial School at Huntingdon.

Judge Walker, in passing sentence upon the Birdsboro honor student, declared that he based his action upon the reports of two psychiatrists who interviewed Myers at different times during his incarceration in the Centre County jail.

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Well Known Establishment May Be Sold; Rumor Other Business Changes in Town

According to well founded reports the Carpeneto Green Grocery in the Brockerhoff Hotel building, will change ownership on April 1, the Carpeneto family expecting to withdraw from the business at that time.

The store, one of Belleville's older and better known independent establishments, is owned by George Carpeneto, whose plans for after April 1 are reported to be indefinite. Negotiations are said to be under way to dispose of the business to a Lock Haven concern.

The Chemical Lime Company offices will remain on the second floor of the passenger station building. No arrangements have been made regarding the first floor of that building at this time.

Mr. Hippie's new location is advantageous for a number of reasons, chief among which are the fact that there is more than ample parking space for the use of customers; more adequate facilities for the sale and handling of farm implements and fertilizers, and added convenience for the use of patrons.
