PREDICT DECREASE IN WPA AND RELIEF CASES

Centre County relief officials are anticipating a sharp decrease in the number of persons on relief and working for WPA during the coming spring and summer, owing to the building programs to be launched at State College and Philadelphia.

The County relief case load has shown a steady decline from its peak at the end of January, and this decline is expected to continue as weather conditions permit the opening of construction work. The number of relief cases last November was 270, and this number had increased to 700 by the end of January. Since then the WPA and private industry have absorbed enough new workers to decrease the present number of relief cases to between 470 and 480.

It is estimated that approximately 50 per cent of the labor which will be needed in the College building program will be of a highly specialized nature, and the remaining 50 per cent unskilled labor is expected to draw heavily upon the available local supply of workers, with a consequent decrease in relief cases and in WPA requirements.

PHILA. LAWYER STANDS TO GET ABOUT \$4,000,000

A Philadelphia lawyer stands to win about \$4,000,000 if all the unclaimed money he has reported to the state finally reaches the Pennsylvania treasury and his claim is approved by the courts. Judge W. C. Sheely in the DuPont county court at Harrisburg, Tuesday issued a writ of mandamus in favor of Attorney Michael

Edelman under a law providing that an informer who reports unclaimed money, prosecutes and proves his case, is entitled to one-fourth of the amounts that revert to the commonwealth. Edelman filed with the court a list of corporations which hold dividends declared but unpaid, matured interest on debts which had not been paid because the owners are unknown, funds owing to unknown persons and unclaimed stock
