

OBITUARY

EDWIN W. STINE

Edwin W. Stine, retired assistant trainmaster of the old Tyrone Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad company and prominent churchman, died at his home in Tyrone Monday evening, following an extended illness. Mr. Stine was seriously injured when run down by an automobile near his home on September 1, 1934. He was taken to the Altoona hospital where he was a patient for two weeks, then taken to his home where he had since been bedfast. Edwin Wagner Stine was a son of David C. and Elma (Wagner) Stine and was born at Millheim, Centre county, on March 3, 1860. He moved to Tyrone with his parents when he was a young lad. He attended the Tyrone public schools and at the age of fourteen years became part time messenger boy for the Pennsylvania Railroad company and two years later was employed as a telegraph operator. He served in this capacity on both the Tyrone and Middle Divisions until November 1887 when he was made train dispatcher. In January, 1900, he became assistant trainmaster of the Tyrone Division which position he held until his retirement from active service in July, 1929. He had 55 years of continuous service with the railroad company. On September 12, 1894, he was united in marriage with Miss Mary Mirra Coulter. In early life he associated himself with the First Presbyterian church and during the intervening years took an active part in all its affairs. Mr. Stine was a member of Sinking Spring Lodge No. 127, Knights of Pythias; the P. R. Veterans Association; Tyrone Lodge No. 494, Free and Accepted Masons; the Jaffa Shrine and the Williamsport Consistory. He also took an active interest in community affairs and served two terms as a member of the Tyrone borough council. He is survived by his wife, One sister, Mrs. Harry Dimes, of Centre Hall, died in May, 1931. Funeral services will be held in the First Presbyterian church this Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in charge of his pastor, Rev. Dr. Joseph A. Speer, assisted by Rev. Howard E. Oakwood, of Millersburg, the Tyrone church and a brother elder of the deceased. Burial will be made in Eastlawn cemetery.

WILLIS DRAPER WOODRING

Willis Draper Woodring, 37, of Port Matilda, died suddenly at 3:30 o'clock Monday morning following a heart attack. Although he complained of a slight indisposition Sunday evening, Mr. Woodring had been in good health and his death came as a shock to his family and many friends. He was a blacksmith and garageman and only a year ago had built a new garage at Port Matilda. Deceased was a son of Porter and Susanna J. Woodring, who were born on May 18, 1890 in the same house in Port Matilda in which he lived and died. On March 4, 1931 he married Claire Ruhl, of Phillipsburg, who survives with three children, Jane, Richard and Frances, all at home. Also surviving are a sister and four brothers, namely: Mrs. M. G. Malnes, of Port Matilda; A. P. Woodring, of Osgood Mills; R. L. Woodring, of Pittsburgh; E. R. Woodring, of McKeesport; and W. P. Woodring, of Lewisburg. Mr. Woodring was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, a member of the Steamtown L. O. O. F., was affiliated with the Moose lodge at Phillipsburg; was a member of the Port Matilda Grange, and was president of the Port Matilda Sportsmen's Association. Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon from the Methodist church at Port Matilda in charge of the Rev. D. A. Sowers. Interment was made in the Presbyterian cemetery, Port Matilda.

MRS. SARAH M. AMMERMAN

Mrs. Sarah Matilda Ammerman, of Port Matilda died at 5:15 o'clock Tuesday morning at her home from chronic myocarditis. Mrs. Ammerman was 75 years, one month and 23 days old at the time of her death. Mrs. Ammerman was a member of the family of Squire William Beckwith, who is considered the founder of Port Matilda. Born at Bald Eagle on January 13, 1863, she was a daughter of William and Isabelle Merriman Beckwith. On May 7, 1887 married George Ammerman, who died in 1927. Mrs. George Sunday of Port Matilda is a surviving daughter and Mrs. Clara Bennett of Port Matilda is a surviving sister. Mrs. Ammerman was affiliated with the Port Matilda Methodist church. Funeral services will be held from her late home at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon with Rev. David A. Sowers officiating. Interment will be made in the Port Matilda cemetery.

RUSSELL PHILIP FRIESE

Russell Philip Friese, one-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Friese, of Beech Creek, died at his home Monday night of complications which followed an illness of whooping cough. In addition to his parents, he is survived by his grandfather, Joshua Rupert, with whom the Friese family resides; also one brother and one sister. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the home. The Rev. David Nelson, pastor of the Blanchard Church of Christ, officiated and interment was made in the Hayes-Fearon cemetery near Blanchard.

WILLIAM ABRAHAM JORDAN

William Abraham Jordan, retired farmer, passed away at his home at Centre Hall, R. D. at 8:45 o'clock yesterday morning after an illness with a heart ailment and complications. A son of Andrew and Risa Bubb Jordan, he was born in Potter township on January 14, 1867, making his age at time of death 71 years, 1 month and 25 days. Survivors include his wife, Ida Klinsfelder Jordan. Funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock Saturday morning from the Tusseyville church, in charge of the Rev. D. R. Keener, of Centre Hall. Interment will be made in the church cemetery.

OSBORNE PUTNAM NASON

O. P. Nason of Julian, R. F. D. after five days illness with pneumonia, died at 10:00 o'clock Wednesday evening, March 2nd, at the home of his niece, Mrs. Dorsey Cronister, with whom he had made his home since the death of his wife, four years ago. A son of Thomas and Margaret Sinclair Nason he was born in New Brunswick, Canada, February 9, 1864, coming to Pennsylvania with his parents when about 14 years of age and settling in the Phillipsburg-Black Moshannon section where he met his future wife, Margaret McCord whom he married at Phillipsburg, December 23, 1880. Mr. Nason was well known for his work in the lumber woods and for his love of fine horses, having spent the greater part of his life in this work through this section of the country. In 1891 he purchased a farm in Huston township where they lived until the death of his wife in February, 1934. Although 69 years old Mr. Nason was unusually active and appeared several years younger than his actual age. The funeral was held Saturday afternoon, March 5, at 2:00 o'clock from the home of his niece, Mrs. Cronister, with the pastor of the Baptist church, Rev. A. G. Herr, officiating. Interment was made in the Beaver Mills cemetery. An unusual feature in connection with the funeral arrangements is the fact that both Mr. and Mrs. Nason were dressed in the wedding clothes of 57 years ago, when last to rest. Mr. Nason was the last surviving member of his family, leaving no brothers, sisters or children. The closest relatives in this section are two nephews and one niece: O. H. Nason of Julian, O. P. McCord of Black Moshannon and Phoebe McCord Cronister of Julian, R. D. Other close relatives are Charles A. Nason of Philadelphia, the Nason families of Canada, Minnesota, Rhode Island and other states; J. C. Andrews of Julian, James Andrews of Phillipsburg, and the members of these families. It is interesting to recall the connection of the McCord-Nason-Andrews families because of the three original marriages, viz: O. P. Nason (in whose respect this notice is written) married Margaret E. McCord; J. C. Nason of Julian, married Jennie McCord Andrews; Rhoda E. Nason married J. R. McCord of Black Moshannon, none of whom are living at this time.

Gerald Tressler, one-year-old son of Ralph and Grace Cummings Tressler, of near Potters Mills, died in the Lewistown Hospital Saturday morning at 11:30 o'clock following an operation. A graduate of the Lock Haven Teachers' College, Mrs. Richens had been engaged in newspaper work in Lock Haven for about twenty years. She was particularly active in civic affairs and an energetic member of the Grange. Funeral services and interment took place in Lock Haven on Monday afternoon.
