Friends of the congregation are invited to enjoy this picture along with the members of St. John's.

The exact number could not be ascertained. If the NLRB order is sustained upon appeal, and if companies effective striking employees who have applied for reinstatement would be entitled to wages from the date they filed applications to be returned to their jobs.
