Officials at Muncy last night reported that a charge of dynamite set off in the river about 2 p. m. yesterday afternoon, about 300 yards below the bridge, caused a body to come to the surface. Before boats could reach the spot the body, believed to have been that of Harry C. Connor, of Burnside, Clearfield County, chief pilot of the raft, again sank beneath the water. The search was con-tinuing unabated last night.
