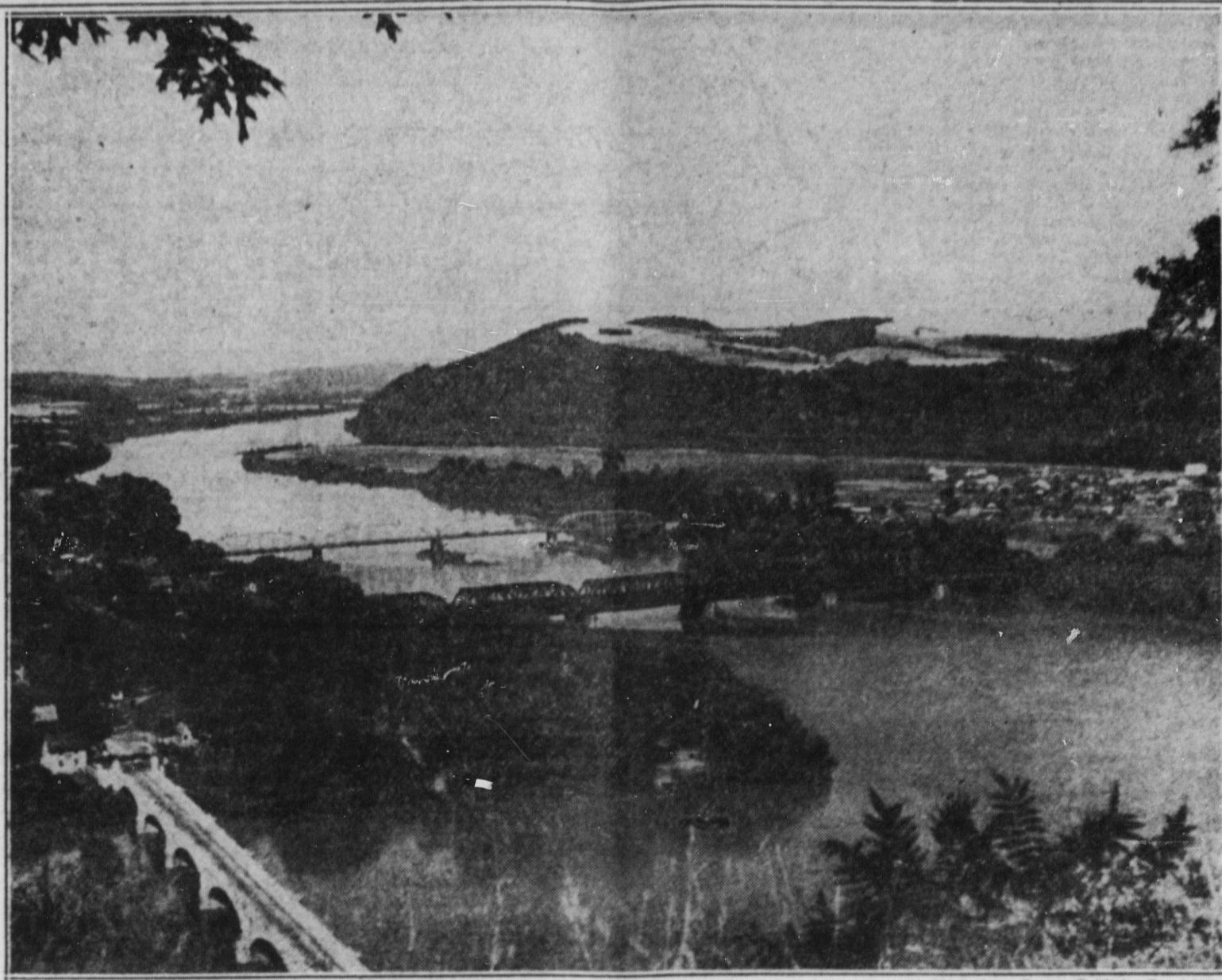


NEWS IN BRIEF AND PERSONALS OF PINE GROVE MILLS
