Kidnapping of Levine Boy Remains Unsolved
The Centre Democrat is in receipt of a circular from chief G-Man, J. Edgar Hoover, containing portraits and descriptions of Peter David Levine, the 12-year-old boy who was kidnapped from the vicinity of his home in New Rochelle, N. Y., on February 24th. The circular also contains an appeal for any information that may lead to the recovery of the boy. Up to this date there has been no trace of the kidnapers, although the father of young Levine has made strenuous efforts to contact them privately and pay whatever ransom is exacted. The Federal Bureau of Investigation has now taken charge of the case and is seeking any possible information that may be used as clues, which accounts for the appeal through the newspaper.

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County Births Exceed Deaths

Centre County's birth rate is more than keeping pace with the death toll, thus saving the county from classification in the race suicide column, a Census Bureau report completed at Washington recently reveals.

Figures compiled by the bureau compare births and deaths in 1936 with those of the year before, and the comparisons result in the conclusions that the excess of births over deaths in Centre County is being sustained annually.

In 1936, Centre County had 561 more births than deaths, while in 1935 it had 560 more births than deaths.

Babies born in Centre County during 1936 numbered 1,201, not counting stillbirths, while 640 persons died in Centre County during the year. In 1935, 1,147 babies were born, and the number of deaths in the county was 587.

Seventy-two infants under one year of age died in Centre County in 1936, giving the county a death rate of 60 per thousand live births.

Of all the babies born in Centre County in 1936 were 1,190, while two colored births were reported during the year.

Crash at Boalsburg Brings Injury to Two
Drivers of two automobiles narrowly escaped serious injury Monday afternoon when their cars crashed at a Boalsburg intersection. A car driven by Frank Bushen of New York City, N. Y., involved in a collision with a vehicle operated by William Rimney, of State College, Pa., was completely demolished in the crash.

Bushen was traveling towards State College on the main highway, when Rimney pulled onto the road, it is reported. The Bushen car is said to have turned over three times after the impact.

With the exception of numerous bruises, neither of the men were injured. Estimated damage to the Bushen car was \$900 while the Rimney car is said to be only slightly damaged.
