Meanwhile Doctor Banks, summoned Sheriff Hoover and State Policeman J. H. Kane, of Lewistown, who happened to be in the sheriff's office. As they headed for Mrs. Stitt's home, Milltown firemen were summoned there.

**FIND ATTACKER DEAD**  
A strong wind had given the flames a good start and the firemen were unable to save the house, barn and a number of smaller buildings.

For several minutes the sheriff and policeman were unable to find any trace of Long. Finally they saw his body lying on a bank about 200 feet from the burning buildings. He had been shot through the neck by a shotgun which lay beside his body.

**HOPED TO BURN HIMSELF**  
His clothes were saturated with kerosene, and there was an unlit match in his left hand. Sheriff Hoover said that the retired farmer had apparently used his right hand to discharge the gun.

The conclusion of the sheriff is that Long had hoped that the shot, which penetrated his neck, would also ignite the match in his left hand, and that the match in turn would set fire to his clothes.

Both Long and Mrs. Stitt are divorced, the authorities say. After Long sold his farm, and made a settlement on his wife, who lives in Altoona, he came to the home of Mrs. Stitt a few years ago.
