### MES. SUSAN (GIEST) REYNOLDS

Mrs. Susan (Giest) Reynolds, 90, died after an illness of several months Tuesday night at the Holydaysburg Presbyterian home where she had been a resident for the past year. ### Vets' Hospital For County Sought

(Continued from page one) and that hundreds of war veterans needing hospitalization must wait their turn, or must be sent to veterans' hospitals in other states. Centre County is located midway between the two present institutions, and would be ideally located to serve veterans residing in the central part of the State.

According to the plan as now outlined any soldier, sailor, marine or other person having seen military or naval duty during any war in which the United States has been engaged would be eligible for treatment at the proposed hospital.

It is anticipated that American Legion Posts throughout the State of Pennsylvania will lend their hearty cooperation and financial aid to bring about the establishment of the institution. State Tax Days, Military Balls and contributions from those who desire to support such a cause would provide funds to purchase the ground and erect the necessary building. It is believed that the Legion is able to raise a substantial fund, the State and Federal Governments may allocate government funds to aid the project.

Local Legion officials reported yesterday that they have in mind a suitable location for the hospital, near Bellefonte, but decline to identify the tract more closely at this time. They declared that in the event their hopes materialize, the work provided in construction would give employment to virtually all unemployed veterans in the state, as well as scores of Centre County's unemployed veterans and civilians.

While no definite steps have been taken by the Legion at this time, the matter has been brought to the attention of various other posts and State officials, and the general sentiment expressed in replies received to date is most encouraging. It is reported. The committee is pushing preliminary work to completion and definite developments are expected in the not too distant future.

### MAN, STRUCK BY CAR, IS PAINFULLY INJURED

Struck and thrown violently to the road by a car while he was crossing West High Street late Friday night, Melvin Showers, aged 24, of East High Street, Bellefonte, escaped with a severe laceration of the head, a sprained shoulder, bruises and shock. He is a son of Merrill Showers, turnkey at the Centre County jail.

The car that struck Showers was driven by Melvin Hockenberry, of Bellefonte, R. D. who was traveling down High Street at the time. According to reports the right front fender of the machine struck the pedestrian, hurling him into the air in such a manner that he landed with most of his weight on his head. The accident happened in front of the G. F. Noll paper and paint store, and Mr. Noll rushed the unconscious man to the Centre County Hospital.

### PAINTING OF PENN'S VIEW TO BE DISPLAYED HERE

A painting of Penn's View, scenic view from the mountains south of Coburn, Centre county, will be placed on display in Bellefonte stores this week. Karl E. Kusse, secretary of the Bellefonte Chamber of Commerce announced yesterday.

The painting, 4 by 6 feet in size, was made by the State Publicity Commission and after it has been displayed in Bellefonte will begin a tour of the State in order to advertise the beauties of the spot to motorists of this and other states.

The illustration is one of three similar paintings made by the Commission. One is of the canyon at Wellboro, another is of a scenic spot in the southern part of the state and the third is the Penn's View picture.
