### **New Tile Floors** At Hospital Here

ture of About \$2000 to Replace Old Flooring

Expert tile setters last week comoleted the construction of new tal, and this week the board authorized the construction of similar floors in six of the private rooms in the maternity ward and in the nursery. The total cost of all the work is expected to be about \$2.

The new floors will replace minwhich are in an unsanitary and badly damaged condition.

To insure permanency, all the old flooring in the hallways was removed before the new material was set in place. The foundation of the new flooring consists of an inch or more of a special cushion cement, which never loses a certain amount of "give." On this base tile eight inch squares were cemented into place. Hard rubber baseboards along the walls provide an absolutely sanitary and waterproof construction, it is claimed.

The new floors are of a mottled gray tile. Horders along the edges break the monotony of the surface, and the special construction gives the floor a "springiness" even though the tile themselves are extremely hard.
