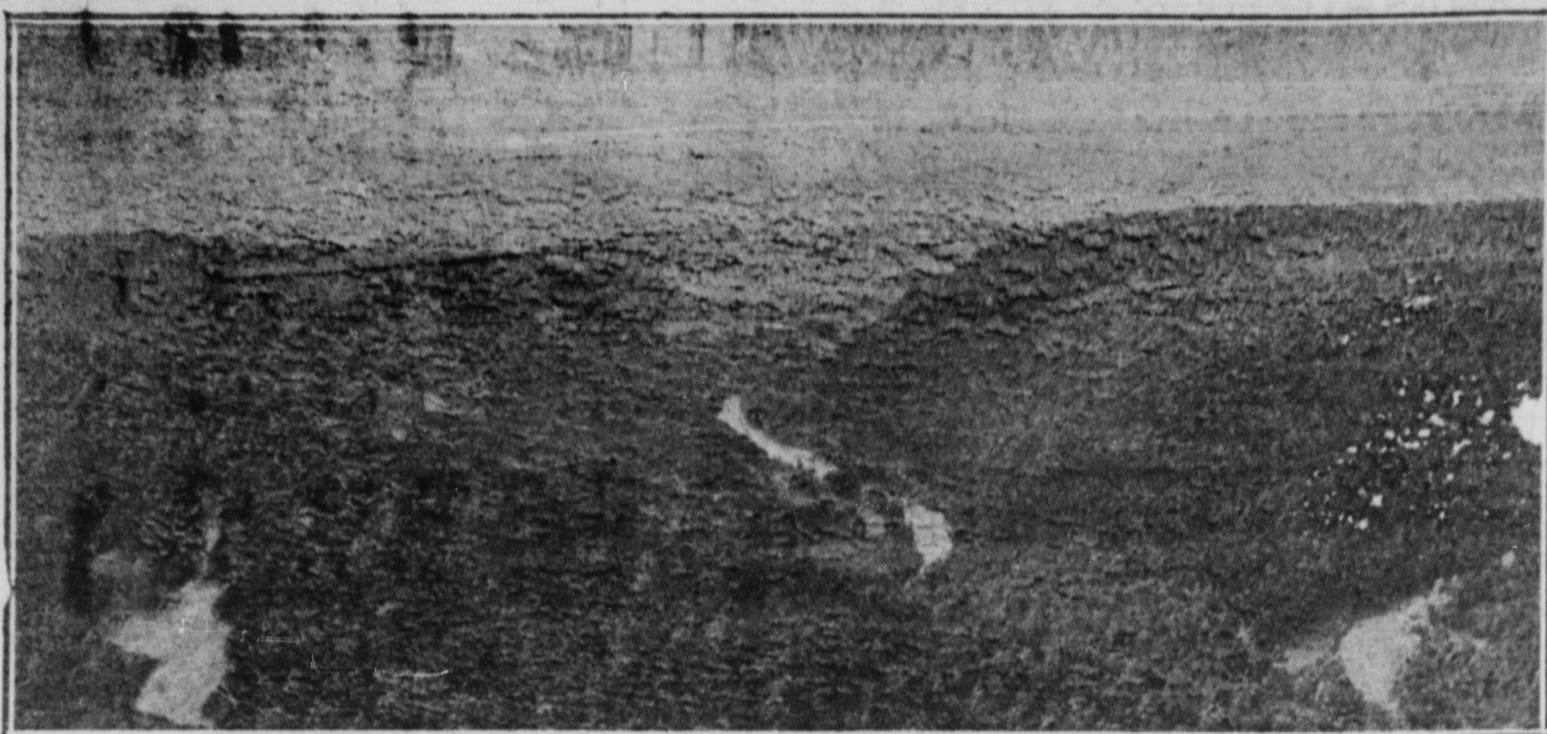


Overlooking Penn's Woods and Waters

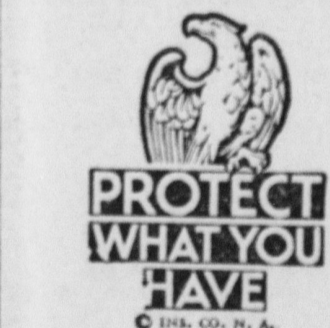
There were 50 patients in the hospital at the beginning of the week.

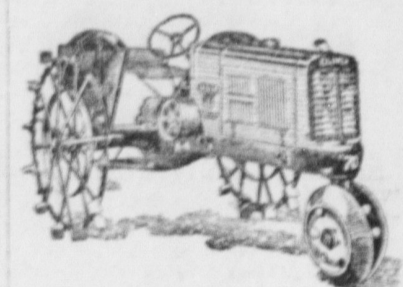

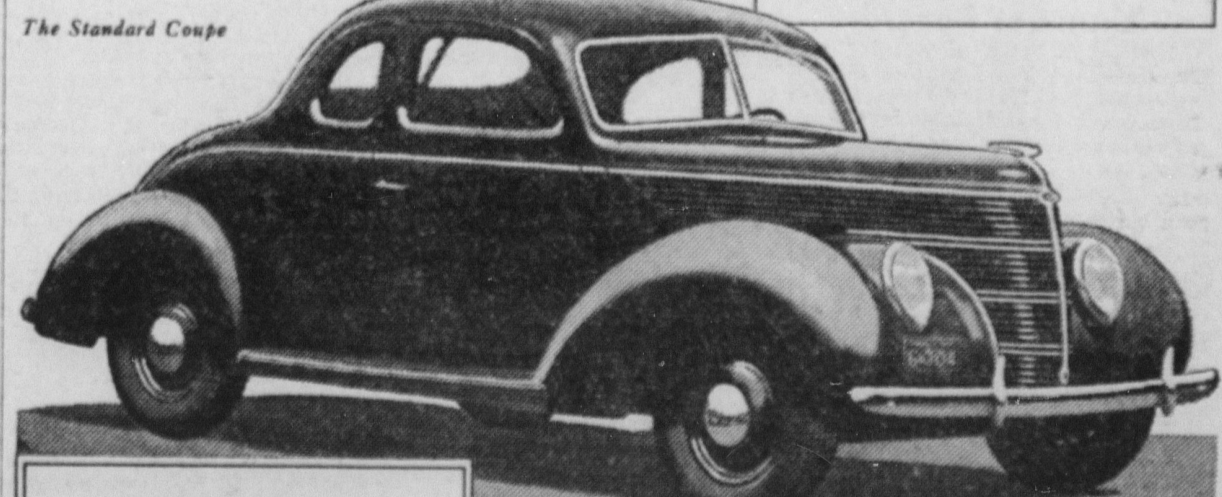
