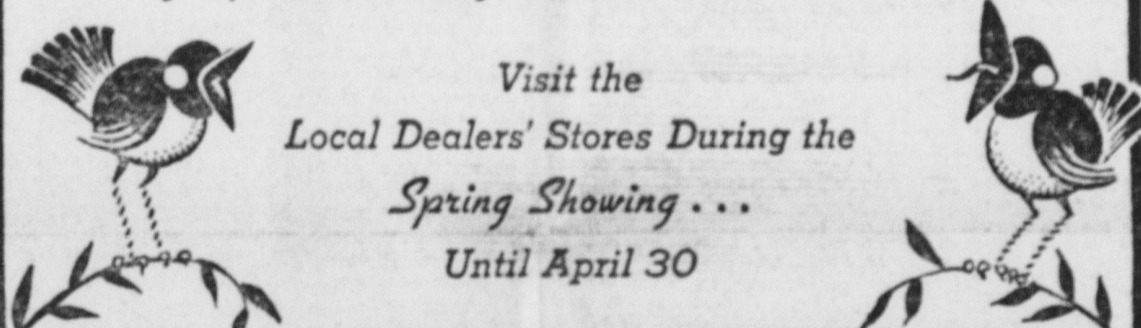

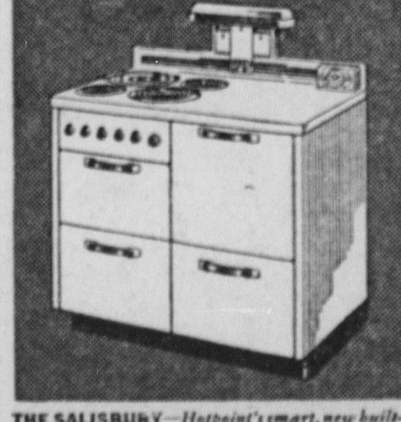

THREE NEW DIRECTORS ON WEST PENN POWER BOARD

Announcement was made on Saturday that Allen N. Cartwright, Vice President, Philip H. Powers, Vice President, and Wilford H. Swinney, Comptroller, have been elected to the Board of Directors of West Penn Power Company.

Mr. Cartwright is a native Pittsburgher and has been in the employ of West Penn Power Company since 1903. In 1911 he was appointed Superintendent of operation, power stations and substations in 1929. General Superintendent of the power division. In 1930 he was elected Vice President of the Power Company in charge of operations, including power generation, transmission and distribution.

Philip H. Powers came to the Pittsburgh Office of West Penn Power Company in 1923 after having been Division Manager of the Keystone Power Company at Bellefonte for one year. In 1924 he returned to the Keystone Power Corporation as General Manager, serving there until 1928 when he was appointed Commercial Manager of West Penn Power Company. In 1930 he was elected Commercial Vice President of West Penn Power Company with complete supervision of industrial, commercial and domestic sales.

Wilford H. Swinney, a native of Texas, joined West Penn Power Company as Comptroller in 1927 after many years of service with the Interstate Commerce Commission and the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, New York.
