Elderly Man Fires Bullet Thru Head

a small roof erected over a depression in the rear yard where water for farm uses was heated in a large kettle. Discovery was made about 6:30 a. m. by his wife, who had been moving the front lawn, and by a son Clair, who had returned to the home to call on his parents.

No one apparently heard the shot that caused death. Another son who had been plowing in a nearby field heard no shot, nor did Mrs. Boob, who believed the noise of the lawn mower drowned out the report of the exploding cartridge.

Mr. Boob had been in poor health for some time and it is believed that continued illness preyed upon his mind, causing him to seek relief in death. The bullet entered his head above the right ear and lodged in the brain. It was a 22 "short" size—the smallest size used in 22 rifles.

After conducting an investigation into the death, Coroner Heaton was the formality of an inquest. William Franklin Boob was a son of Isiah and Alice Boob and was born at State College on April 22, 1873, making his age at time of death 65 years and 6 days. On October 8, 1894, he was united in marriage with Hannah C. Rhine, who survives. Also surviving are his father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. Isiah Boob, of Woodward, and the following sons and daughters:
