—A most interesting relic of the Civil War is owned by John H. Garver, of Centre Hall, R. D., in the form of an old leather bill folder picked up on a battlefield by his father, Henry Garver, a native Centre Countyman. According to a note in the billfold, penned by a finder on June 30, 1862, Mr. Garver, a private in Co. 5th, Pennsylvania Reserve Corps found the purse that day on the battlefield of Charles City Crossroads, sometimes known as the White Oak Swamp battlefield, on Frazier's farm, Glendale, N. C. Mr. Garver's company had taken part in the engagement. Inside the billfold at the time of its discovery, and still undisturbed to this day, are two 20-dollar bills, issued by the State of Missouri and labeled "Missouri Defence Bonds." The finder of the purse served two enlistments covering 4 years and 5 months of service, participated in a number of major battles, and never received even a scratch. He was born and spent his life in the substantial log cabin in which his son now lives. John Garver, present owner of the relic, has one daughter, Miss Mary, a registered nurse now living at home. Of a family of eight children born to the Civil War veteran John is now the only survivor.

MRS. MILLER MAKES PLEA FOR OLD-LINE DEMOCRACY. In an address before an audience of several hundred persons at the Court House Monday night, Mrs. Emma Guffey Miller, sister of United States Senator Joseph P. Guffey, speaking in the interests of the Kennedy-Smith ticket, made a strong plea for old-line Democracy and old-line Democratic principles.

She described Kennedy as being the only candidate in the present gubernatorial campaign whose character has remained unimpaired and whose record in the past is no indication that labor can control or dictate to him in the event he is elected. "The laws of our land are such that no state government can be administered in the interests of any one group," she declared.

Ralph E. Evans, of Luzerne County, Counsel for the Treasury Department, speaking in the absence of Judge Ralph H. Smith, who was unexpectedly called to Allegheny County, declared the Kennedy-Smith ticket is one that should appeal most strongly to true Democrats all over the State, and predicted an overwhelming majority for that slate next Tuesday.

Henry A. Broeckerhoff, of Bellefonte, presided at the meeting and introduced the speakers, while music was furnished by the Bellefonte High School Band.
