formerly of the East Penn's Valley High School, and William Westberg, of Grassflat, will become teachers here with the opening of school in the fall.

Aumiller, former star pitcher for the Millheim Baseball club, is a native of Hartleton. Following his graduation from the Pennsylvania State College he taught for four years in the schools of Hartleton. For the past four years he has been a teacher in the East Penn's Valley High School, Millheim, and recently received his master's degree from Penn State. At the Bellefonte High School he will teach science and will act as assistant coach of the various school athletic teams.

After graduation from the Cooper Township High School, Clearfield County, Mr. Westberg attended the Dickinson Junior College at Williamsport for two years. He attained such a high scholastic rating that he became one of several "exchange" students sent to China for a year's study in a University in that country.

Upon his return to the United States he entered the Pennsylvania State College, from which institution he was graduated in 1937. For the past year he has been teaching in the upper grades of the Wimburne schools, and in Bellefonte he will replace Miss Gergette Purnell, who has been on the faculty since January on a part-time basis. The Board has found that it is more economical to employ teachers on a full time rather than a part-time basis.

Westberg will teach English and reading in the 7th and 8th grades, and also will be assigned other classes in a rearrangement of schedules.

### HEALTH BEST PREVENTION AGAINST DISEASED CHICKS

A successful year with poultry requires adherence to a few simple rules, according to R. C. Blaney, County Agent.

Chicks should be kept growing since thrift is nature's best provision against poultry diseases. Careful common-sense brooder house management will prevent set-backs which often result in stunted growing or make the birds prey to diseases. Learn to observe the behavior of the chicks then change heat and ventilation to suit their needs. The brooder stove usually can be operated with very little adjustment when ventilation is adequate. Adjust brooder house windows and curtains at least four times daily to provide best ventilating conditions. Reduce the heat and increase the ventilation to a point where the chicks may be without heat by the time they are six to eight weeks of age. By then they should be using the roosts.

### Pony Air Mail Will Fly Today

airmen have arranged to conduct the pony air mail service in the county today—or tomorrow in the event weather conditions this afternoon make flying too hazardous. They are Sherman Lutz, of the State College Air Depot, and Henry Noll, of Pleasant Gap.

Lutz will leave the Bellefonte airport, about 4 miles southeast of town, at 1:10 p. m. and will go to Kylesburg, where he will place aboard eastbound transport ships all mail destined for eastern cities. From Kylesburg he will fly to Pittsburgh to transfer all western mail onto planes in the regular western mail service.

Noll will leave the local airport at 2:10 o'clock and is scheduled to arrive in Williamsport in time to make connections with regular mail planes going north to Buffalo; south to Washington, and east to New York.

The two pilots will collect outgoing mail at State College and Centre Hall before coming to Bellefonte.

Because the Post Office Department does not wish to subject volunteer pony air mail flyers to unnecessary risks, the service will be postponed today if the weather is not suitable. In that event the same schedule will be carried out Friday.
