Criminal Court To Close Today

Houser, Found Guilty, Draws Prison Term; Manslaughter Case Continued

Although no court was held on election day, the trial of the criminal docket for the regular May term of Court proceeded swiftly this week, and the only case remaining to be tried before the session closes is one in which three Phillipsburg men are charged with larceny. This case will be called this Thursday morning.

The only remaining case to be disposed of, one in which Judge Ivan Walker was interested before his elevation to the bench, will go to trial Monday morning before Judge Utley, of Mifflin county, before the first case for the May civil term is called.

Cyrus Houser, aged 40, of Williamsport, charged with forgery, was found guilty by a jury and was sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution and undergo imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary for a period of two to four years.

Charles Spackman, of Port Matilda, charged with rape and bastardy, was acquitted on both counts by a jury which heard the case.

A jury in the case of J. H. Holmes of State College, charged with issuing worthless checks, found him not guilty but directed that he pay the costs of prosecution.

Harry Frelin, of Phillipsburg, entered a plea of guilty to driving a car without the consent of the owner and was sentenced to pay the costs and serve six months in the county jail.

John Burge, of Morrisdale, was found guilty by a jury on a charge of drunken driving and was sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail.

A jury in the case of Sam Hodul, of Phillipsburg, charged with assault and battery, had not returned a verdict late last night.

Two cases were continued. They are: Robert G. Haines, of Phillipsburg, charged with false pretense; and Byron E. Bartley, of Port Matilda, charged with involuntary manslaughter. Another case in which John W. Garis, of Bellefonte, is charged with drunken driving, was not brought to trial because Garis' attorney claimed the defendant is ill health.

Another case was settled out of court. In this action James Denning, of Phillipsburg, and Leroy Fieck and George Poorman, of Winburne, were charged with assault and battery.

The trial scheduled to be heard today is that of Lawrence Shunk-wiler, Edward Reed and Theophilus Shope, all of Phillipsburg, charged jointly with larceny.

Joseph Bradley and Patrick McGordie, of Snow Shoe are the two defendants who are to go on trial before Judge Utley, Monday morning. They are jointly charged with larceny.
