CHILDREN MIX A MEAL FOR SOIL-LESS PLANTS
With scales, spoons, chemicals, a wash tub and a bicycle pump, nine school children recently mixed a meal for the plants which grow without soil in Rockefeller Center's Sky Gardens.

To feed the tomato, bean, and onion plants which grow in a tankful of water and chemicals in the Sky Gardens, the children had to weigh the chemicals on scales, mix them in a wash tub, and pour them into the tank. Then they had to pump air into the water with a bicycle pump to add oxygen and purify the water.

The plants in the soil-less garden, which look like an aquarium tank on stilts, are anchored in wire trays covered with a blanket of glass wool two inches thick to keep them from slipping too deep into their permanent bath.
