

Sarah Ann's Cooking Class

Eggs are universally recognized as a meat substitute and the common denominator of easily prepared dishes.

Egg Mornay With Ham Poach eggs and place on thin rounds of broiled ham.

Eggs a la Benedict 6 eggs. 3 muffins. Thin sliced ham. Hollandaise sauce.

Eggs Poached in Tomato Soup Put 1 can condensed tomato soup in shallow frying pan—let come to a boiling point.

Creole Eggs 1 cup tomato soup. 6 eggs, hard boiled. 1 cup diced celery.

Grated cheese may be sprinkled over the top if desired.

Asparagus Omelet. 3 eggs. Salt and pepper. 4 tablespoons of hot water.

Chandroid of Eggs 2 tablespoons fat. 2 tablespoons flour. 1 cup well seasoned chicken stock.

Eggs and Sausage. Cook tiny sausages until brown, arrange them around the edge of a ramekin lined with bread crumbs.

Tomatoes Stuffed With Egg Select rather small tomatoes. Scoop them out sufficiently to accommodate the half of a hard boiled egg.

120-YEAR-OLD NEWSPAPER INTERESTING RELIC OF PAST

We had the pleasure of inspecting a most interesting relic this week in the form of a copy of The Centre Democrat, dated October 17, 1835—just 103 years old.

At the time the 1835 issue was published, S. T. Shugert was owner, and the subscription rate was \$2.00 per year if paid in advance.

The total vote cast for the office of Governor that year in Centre county was 3,258. As was the custom of most newspapers in that age, local news was not considered of sufficient importance to publish.

Notwithstanding the fact that over twelve hundred ardent disciples of Isaac Walton thronged "Fisher's Row" on the day of his Moore, teacher in the Centre Hill borough schools, will terminate his teaching profession after forty-four years of service in the school room. Mr. Moore has tendered his resignation, effective at the close of the present term. He is eligible for re-employment, under the State School Employees' Retirement System, and will receive a pension as long as he lives. The two charter members still living are Mrs. Olive Strohm, ninety-three, and Mrs. Joe Enzel, eighty-seven, Bethlehem.
