Hearth. Pronounce harth, a as in arm, not herth.

Inopportune. Pronounce the u as in unit, with principal accent on last syllable.

Chasm. Pronounce kaz'm, one syllable, and not kaz-un.

Regime. Pronounce raz-ehm, a as in ray, e as in me, accent last syllable.

Marshmallow. Pronounce second a as in at, not mellow.

Digestion. Pronounce first i as in did, not as in die.

Proof, two o's; prove, one o. Ba-zar; three a's. Extent (size, length); extant (in existence). Annuity, two n's. Demosnstrat; though pronounce day-no-mang, oo as in too, second a as in ah, accent second syllable. Calvary (the place where Christ was crucified); do not confuse with cavalry.

Sarah Ann's Cooking Class

Souffles are a combination of a thick white sauce and eggs, with variations of flavor. They may be made as a variety of savories at the occasion demands. The souffle is a good way to use left-overs. A little leftover meat, a little bit of vegetables, a little canned fruit, all of these may be the beginning of a royal dish.

Spinach Souffle
2 tablespoons butter or butter substitute.
3 tablespoons flour.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 cup milk.
1 cup finely chopped cooked spinach.
3 eggs.
Melt fat, add flour and salt and mix well. Add milk gradually and bring to the boiling point, stirring constantly. Add well-beaten egg yolks and the chopped cooked spinach. Remove from stove and cool. Fold the stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into a greased baking dish and bake 50 minutes in an oven 350 degrees. Serve immediately.

Chicken Mushroom Souffle
3 tablespoons butter or butter substitute.
4 tablespoons flour.
1/2 cup milk.
3 eggs.
1 teaspoon chopped parsley.
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce.
1 cup cooked chicken, chopped fine.
Melt fat, add flour, mix well and cook until it bubbles. Then add the mushroom soup diluted with the milk. Cook until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Cool. Add the well-beaten egg yolks, the parsley, Worcestershire, the chicken and the chicken. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into a well-greased baking dish and bake 50 to 60 minutes in oven 350 degrees. Serve at once.

Carrot Souffle
4 tablespoons fat.
4 tablespoons flour.
1/2 teaspoon salt, pepper.
1/2 cup water.
1 cup evaporated milk.
1 1/2 cups carrot pulp.
3 eggs.
Melt fat, add flour, salt and pepper and mix well. Gradually add water (in which carrots were cooked) and milk. Add carrot pulp which has been rubbed through a sieve and bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Beat egg yolks and add to sauce. Cool. Fold in well-beaten egg whites. Pour into a well-greased baking dish and bake in an oven 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Serve at once.

Custard Souffle
3 tablespoons butter.
4 tablespoons flour.
1 cup milk.
4 eggs.
4 tablespoons sugar.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
Melt butter, add flour and mix until smooth. Add milk, gradually and bring to boiling point, stirring constantly. Beat egg yolks until thick and add sugar and salt. Add to the hot mixture, stirring until blended. Cool slightly. Add vanilla and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into a well-greased baking dish and bake in an oven 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Serve at once.

Chocolate Souffle
Use the recipe for custard souffle. Melt 2 squares of unweetened chocolate over hot water, add 2 tablespoons of sugar and 2 tablespoons of hot water. Stir until smooth and add to the hot milk mixture just before adding the egg yolks. Serve with whipped cream.

Oceanut Souffle
2 tablespoons butter.
2 tablespoons flour.
4 tablespoons sugar.
3 cup milk-salt.
3 eggs-1 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 cup shredded coconut.
Melt butter, add flour and mix until smooth. Add milk and sugar gradually and cook in double boiler until thick, stirring constantly. Cool slightly and add well-beaten egg yolks. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites, then add coconut, salt and vanilla. Turn into a well-greased baking dish and bake 50 minutes in an oven 350 degrees. Serve with lemon sauce immediately.
