

The building program, calling for one million man-hours of labor, is expected to begin within two or three weeks. Absorption of the lists of unemployed Pennsylvania Railroad workers in the Altoona area is expected to be gradual, but all men are expected to be called back to their jobs within six weeks, it was stated by a semi-official informant in Altoona last night.

The program is to be financed through the issuance by the railroad of Equipment Trust Certificates, and from the \$8,000,000 provided in this way, new freight and passenger cars, locomotives and other rolling equipment are to be built.

The announcement in Altoona of the new program is expected to have far-reaching results. In the past year or more work in the railroad shops has been seriously curtailed, and since the latter part of last December the city has been hard hit by the virtual closing of the shops. which represent the lifeblood of Altoona's economic system.


