MANUAL TRAINING EXHIBIT SHOWS FINE WORKMANSHIP

During the commencement season hundreds of persons have visited the Bellefonte High School manual training and home economics display in the gymnasium on North Springs Street.
In the manual training department this year are some exceptionally fine articles of furniture, including an odd chair with a cane seat. Among the 18 pieces of furniture in the display are cedar chests, tables and stands of all descriptions, lawn furniture, book and magazine racks, and practically all the smaller items of household furniture.
The project this year as a whole are larger in size and more ambitious in design than they have been for several years, and the standard of workmanship is unusually high. The manual training department, under the efficient supervision of Harry C. Menold, has been enlarged, and students now have ample room for working, and for storing rough lumber and unfinished projects, making it possible for the department to be conducted in a more efficient manner.
Another factor which is believed to have contributed to the high standard of the work is the addition of a lathe to the department's facilities. For a time Mr. Menold had only one lathe on which to instruct classes ranging up to nearly 100 students. The department is now well laid-out, well lighted, and well equipped although additional wood-working machinery could be used to excellent advantage.
The home economics display consists of dresses and other items made by students in the home economics department. The displays are open to public inspection every evening from 7 to 9 p. m.
