NEED A PILL?

It may not be long before an automobile driver will swallow a capsule to help him out of motor accidents at night. That procedure was hinted at in an article in the Ohio Medical Journal. The capsule is filled with carotene-in-oil, a potent source of vitamin A. Vitamin A improves vision in the dark, reducing eye strain and fatigue, two big causes of motor mishaps. Use of the capsule as "safe driving medicine" was indicated indirectly by the experimenters: Dr. Ralph C. Wise, eye specialist of Mansfield, O., and Dr. O. H. Shetter of the medical department of the Westinghouse Electric Company.
