County Will Ignore Order (Continued from page one) passes for which appropriations have not been made in the budget, nor may the total expenditures exceed the total amount appropriated.

The Commissioners add that \$70 additional expense placed upon the district through the establishment of such service would exceed the total budget appropriations by more than \$10,000.

These rules and regulations set up a county medical and nursing service for all indigent persons, including those in county institutions and all persons on relief and old age assistance rolls.

These illnesses which cause acute suffering, interfere with earning capacity, endanger life or threaten some loss and preventable handicap, qualify for treatment.
