The service is in charge of Paul Walzer, Lock Haven, who has conducted a similar exchange in that city several years. The purpose of the exchange is to return to the respective local dairies milk bottles which are cluttering garages, cellars, vacant houses and other storage places. The purchase of bottles to replace ones lost and broken is one of the major overhead expenses in the conduct of dairies, and it is believed that the exchange will result in the return of hundreds of bottles to their rightful owners. Persons having milk bottles in their possession are asked to notify any local dairy of that fact and the exchange will call for them. The service is beneficial both to the public and to the dairies, for many households are plagued with empty milk bottles belonging to dairies other than the one they patronize regularly. Tell your milkman about your collection of bottles, and the exchange will remove them for you, free of charge.
