Lowell Thomas, radio commentator, and lecturer, speaking from Rockefeller Center in New York, talked with his friend George Perrot world traveler, in the Taj Mahal, at Agra, India.

The conversation traveled back and forth by short wave between New York and London, then was relayed by short wave from across Europe and Asia, across Arabia, Persia and half-way across India to the city of Poona. From there the voices of the speakers traveled the rest of the way by land wire to the Taj Mahal.
