PRINCIPALS IN ANNIVERSARY

Cyrus Walker, 95, resides with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Merkle, on Sunset road, State College. He left for Gettysburg yesterday morning by automobile with his official attendant, John Wolfe, a son-in-law, of Jersey Shore.

The other State College Civil War veteran, Madison Monroe Garver, 89, is unable to attend the celebration. Although his health is excellent considering his advanced years, Mr. Garver is unable to do much walking because of a hip injury suffered last August. Another Civil War veteran in this section of the county is George Thomas, of Howard township, who voted for Abraham Lincoln for president while he was still in the army at Petersburg. Mr. Thomas will be unable to attend the anniversary celebration because of physical incapacities.

Mr. Walker was born in Clinton-dale, Clinton county, November 23, 1842, the oldest of a family of seven children. His parents, Judith and Philip Walker, were pioneers in this section of the country and owned many acres of land throughout Mitty Valley.

A member of the Seventh Pennsylvania Cavalry which entered the Civil War in the fall of 1861, Mr. Walker joined his comrades at the age of 19 at Nashville, Tennessee, in the spring of 1862.

Mr. Walker spent three years in Tennessee, Alabama, and Georgia, going through many of the historic battles with several thrilling experiences. He came through the war unscathed, although he spent some time in a hospital recovering from an illness suffered in the swamps of Georgia.

Fighting with what was known as the Western Army, or the Sabre Regiment of the Potomac, Mr. Walker took part in the savage battles of Murfreesboro, Nashville, and at Chickamauga.

Despite the fact that he did not join the Seventh Pennsylvania Regiment until nearly six months after the Civil War started, Mr. Walker was in the first battle fought by the Mitty Valley unit.

Toward the close of the war, he was stationed at a sawmill a few miles from his regiment when a small boy told him an army was approaching. Hiding in a cornfield
