150,000 ON BATTLEFIELD AS PRESIDENT DEDICATES LIGHT

President Roosevelt looked out across the Gettysburg battlefield on Sunday and challenged America to fight eternally for peace through democracy. "Here in our land we give thanks that, avoiding war, we seek our ends through the peaceful processes of popular government under the Constitution," the President told a mammoth crowd of probably 150,000 gathered at the close of a sweltering day on the slopes of Oak Hill.

1800 Veterans There Commemorating the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg, Mr. Roosevelt spoke to 1800 Blue and Gray clad veterans of the Civil War meeting for a final reunion on a field where the bitterness of war has softened into friendly peace.

As his voice died away, two aged men—one in dark blue and one in gray—trudged to the hilltop and grasped the edges of a fifty-foot flag suspended there. The fading sun glinted on their military braids as they pulled the banner free and disclosed a towering memorial dedicated to "peace eternal in a Nation united."

A cheer rippled across the crowd that stretched far out across the meadows and, a moment later, the voices mounted to a roaring salute as a thread of pale flame spurted from the crown of the white stone tower, rippled and spread—to burn forever—against the blue and white of the summer sky.

Sun Shines on Scene The ceremony was set against a shrine of America's struggle for unity. To the west was the sturdy line of the Blue Ridge, hazy in the distance.

PAYS \$180 AND COSTS FOR 14 UNDERSIZE TROUT
