Pepper Hash.

2 dozen red ball peppers, 1 quart vinegar, 3 cups sugar, 6 onions. Remove the white fibre and seed from the peppers and peel the onions. Chop finely, then pour boiling water over them. Let stand 3 minutes, and drain. Cook together the vinegar, sugar and salt, add the peppers, sugar and onions. Boil up once. Put in sterilized jars and seal closely.

Sesqui-Centennial At Millheim Closes

Fitch; a car bearing some of the town's oldest citizens; Millheim borough Council; Aaronsburg band; pioneers; a covered wagon; Woman's Club float; Civic Club float; Legionnaires; Spring Mills band; East Penn's Valley High School float; Girls Scouts representing Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs; school groups; Millmont band; Boy Scouts, industrial float, and the Centennial Band.

The parade was about one mile long and it was estimated that more than 500 persons participated. Farmers had their own parade, when features of special interest to farm groups were given first preference.

At an open air vesper service held Sunday evening, more than 1500 persons heard Dr. Frederick K. Stamm, of the Brooklyn Congregational church, a native of Millheim speak. The service was presided by a musical program by 75 mixed voices under the direction of Albert H. Stover, of Millheim.

Hunter and Caldwell, architects for the Institution District, also have been retained by the Bellefonte School Board in the proposed construction of a new wing to the high school building.

Their plans for the County home call for a building large enough to accommodate 100 persons. In the building will be a dispensary, recreation rooms for men and women, elevator service and other modern conveniences, and ample garage space surrounding the building.

The building itself consists of a basement, and first and second floors. Among the specifications are a concrete foundation, a brick and the superstructure, hollow tile partitions, concrete and tile floors and steel framework throughout. The structure will be fireproof and vermin-proof.

Man Injured As Fuel Tank Is Shattered

Thousands at July Fourth Display Here

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speculators five and six deep lined the entire east fence of the spacious field. In addition, hundreds more crowded along the north and south fences, while untold hundreds watched the aerial display from cars parked almost solidly along roads as far distant as the road leading from Zion to Pleasant Gap.

There is no way to estimate the number of persons who saw the 45-minute display of fireworks, but it is safe to say that at least 5,000 persons saw the free show from inside the field boundaries.

Bellefonte hasn't seen a traffic jam like Monday night's since along about 1830 when they hauled a loaded barge up Spring Creek from Milesburg to prove to State officials that the town was located along a navigable stream. After the display it took cars headed from Bellefonte toward Hecla Park up to an hour to get from the top of Bishop street hill to the cavalry post. Cars parked on Hughes field were more than an hour getting out of the lot despite the work of several traffic officers at various exits and along Bishop street.

And it was a good show. The score of more of local business houses and individuals who contributed to the \$150 fund for the purchase of one-fourth ton of fireworks have seldom spent \$5 or \$10 to the better gratification of the fireworks-loving public.

Practically everyone was there. From the Mayor on down, Councilmen, business executives, merchants, housewives, farmers—all of them were represented. The kiddies were there in droves, and let it be said now that a better behaved set of youngsters never watched a sky rocket do its stuff. Although the Logan and Urdine Fire Companies had a large staff of members on hand to police the field, they had little to do, for not one youngster, nor grown-up, went beyond the guard ropes separating the spectators' section from the portion of the field reserved for firing the display.

Beginning with the firing of several aerial bombs, Bellefonte's Fire Marshal John J. Bower kept the air blue with the smoke from more than 100 separate pieces fired with sufficient regularity to keep the crowd's interest always at a peak. Martin Miller and a crew of firemen were the torch bearers and had charge of the actual firing of the pieces.

There were no accidents to mar the affair, and again the Bellefonte Chamber of Commerce amply illustrated that when it promises something, it really means business. The show was 45—and more—than the Chamber promised, and many a word of dissatisfaction or disappointment has been heard regarding the display.

The choice aerial pieces were the ones which upon exploding high over the field released a score or so of fish-shaped balls of fire which wiggled, whirled and scooted through the sky. The choice display pieces were the "battle between two
