Boros Seek Funds Held By Overseers

Brockerhoff, chairman of the finance committee of Borough Council, and as a taxpayer and resident of the borough.

Mr. Brockerhoff's petition sets forth that the borough audit filed May 13, 1938 shows that there is on deposit in various banks a total of \$178.82 in the names of Alexander Morrison and Bertha Klinger as Overseers of the Poor in the Borough. In addition, the statement holds, there is now in the hands of the tax collector approximately \$2,000 from poor tax collections.

The borough audit shows that the only indebtedness to the district is \$244.65 owed to the State Hospital at Danville.

Mr. Brockerhoff's statement continues that Mr. Morrison and Mrs. Klinger have neglected or failed to turn over these funds to the borough, in accordance with the State Act establishing the County Institution District system of administering aid to indigent persons.

In concluding the complaint asks the court to direct the Overseers to turn over to the borough the \$3,176.62 now on deposit; the other moneys which they have received since the audit, and all other funds from poor taxes received by the collector.

The Phillipsburg action, similar in nature to the Bellefonte matter, is brought by E. C. Fish, president of the Borough Council. He alleges that Poor Overseers Thomas Byron and Louis Hohinka have on deposit for the poor district a grand total of \$4,832.54.

Since January 1, the statement continues, the borough has made repeated demands to the overseers to turn over these funds, but the Overseers have not done so, it is claimed. The Borough is entitled to the money, Mr. Fish's presentation sets forth, and he asks for a Court order directing the Overseers to make the transfer at once.

In the Phillipsburg action, poor district funds in the Moshannon National Bank, now in process of liquidation, also are asked to be assigned to the Borough.

The Commissioners yesterday reported that of the 36 poor districts in the county, 15 of them have turned their affairs to the County Institution District, in compliance with the new law.

The local Institution District's interpretation of the law is that where a poor district is free of debt, money remaining on deposit to the Overseers' account becomes the property of the borough or township.

Where the Poor District is in debt, the affairs of the Overseers are turned over to the Institution District for liquidation. In case there is insufficient funds in any district to meet debts the Institution Board is authorized to levy a special tax to make up the deficiency, Board members said.
