The body was taken off the train at Washington and was taken to Tyrone where funeral services were held Monday morning. From Tyrone the cortege proceeded to the Centre Hall cemetery where interment was made. Mr. McCormack was born in Potter township, where he spent his early life. Early in the present century he moved to Columbia, South Carolina, where he established what later became one of the largest, if not the largest, undertaking establishments in that city. Penn State Asks \$17,000,000 More. (Continued from page one) The \$17,000,000 figure submitted Tuesday represents the amount needed to complete the College's physical plant. Because of the deadline, September 30, required by the PWA for submission of applications, it would be practically impossible to get the entire program in shape for presentation but that he hoped that plans for a number of units would be ready by that time. President Ralph D. Hetzel asked Governor Earle at a conference Tuesday if he would support an additional \$17,000,000 construction program under the new Public Works Administration allocation. Earle said he would consider it a worthy project and support most of it if not all.

Centre Hall Man Sued For \$2,291. (Continued from page one) Kenneth Knepp, also of Reedsville, who asks \$291.48 to cover damage to his car. According to the statements of Knepp, Henry accepted a ride to State College in Knepp's car. While they were driving toward that town, a car driven by Miller is said to have pulled onto the highway in front of the Knepp machine, at a point about 4 miles west of Pottery Mills. In the resulting collision Henry claims he received the following injuries: lacerations above the right eye and eyebrow, laceration of the cheek and nose, a stoved little finger on the right hand, and numerous bruises and abrasions of the body. The statements set forth that the accident was caused by the negligence of Miller, who, it is claimed, crossed the road diagonally in front of the Knepp car. Knepp has brought suit in his own behalf to recover damages of \$291.48 resulting to his car in the collision.
