Sees Need For Law Enforcement

(Continued from page one) The proper administration of law...

Speaking concerning the work of the Court, Judge Walker stated that great power is invested in a judge. If he uses this power arbitrarily or with partiality, there is little room for his actions.

Many calls are made upon the Judge's time between the sessions of the court in reviewing petitions, preparing decisions, and other phases of court work, he continued.

Some calls that are made are not within the province of the judge, such as collecting bills, fixing up neighborhood quarrels, or settling family difficulties, which have not appeared before the court.

In most cases pleas are made for mercy on the excuse of some member of the family being injured by incarceration of the offender. If this was needed practically no one would be sentenced, the speaker added.

It is generally thought by the public that the judge can do as he pleases in the sentencing of convicted persons. This is not true.

In a trial the judge acts merely as a referee and sees that the case is kept in its proper channels. After conviction the place of incarceration and the penalty are defined.

A sentence for less than a year brings confinement in the county jail; for more than a year the prisoner is generally sent to the penitentiary, if he is over twenty-six years of age.

The next day, after loafing along in Stone Valley and the Allen Seager Forest, we made tracks for the cave country. At Woodward it was 90 degrees in the shade outside, and so cool in the cave that overcoats felt good. It's a nice cave, and the man in charge gave us plenty of time to see it, and stretch our imaginations, trying to see all the figures and faces on the walls.

That evening we registered at Hotel De Strawn in the mountains near Woodward. The accommodations were excellent, running water outside to sing us to sleep in our hayrack bed, an open-air dining room, and a troupe of deer in the field to entertain us. My only regret was that I couldn't stay there a month.

And then over to Coburn, up the mountain to Penn Vista, and some view it is—and fishing and camping in Penn Creek at Pre-Paddy Park—an awfully nice creek and a pretty park.

After driving through Penns Valley, Brush Valley, Fishing Creek and down to Will Keichline's leanling larch at Nittany, we felt that we had seen some of the finest country anywhere. The old name one place he called "paradise"—but then he found there were a lot of paradises in those hills.
