#### DOG TRAINING SEASON WILL OPEN AUGUST 20

The season for training hunting opens Aug. 20 and continues until March 31, according to state game regulations. It is unlawful to train dogs on Sunday, unless the consent of the owner of the land where such training is done has first been secured, but no such consent is required in the case of state and national forest lands.

The hours for training are from sunrise to 9 p. m., and the dog must be under control of the owner. They may be trained on any game except elk, deer, bear or wild turkey, so long as no firearms usually raised at arm's length and fired from the shoulder are carried and no injury is inflicted on the animals or birds.

The attention of hunters is called to the fact that the season on woodchuck, commonly known as groundhog closes on Sept. 15.
