picket lines when their wage scale was reduced from \$1.25 to \$1.00 an hour. The following day, Thursday, truck drivers refused to cross picket lines, and with the remainder of the workmen unable to secure materials, the entire program automatically closed down.

Pending a final settlement of the question, members of the cement workers' union returned to their jobs Tuesday at the old scale of \$1.25. If arbitration results in the rate being lowered to \$1.00 per hour, the union will reimburse McCloskey and Company, general contractors, for the difference from the time the men returned to work.

This arrangement was agreed to Monday after a conference in which Matthew H. McCloskey, of Philadelphia, head of the contracting firm; Faber McCloskey, mediator for the State Department of Labor and Industry, and representatives of the local unions, participated.

Also under arbitration is a request from the members of Local No. 1111, International Hod Carriers, Builders and Common Laborers for a wage increase from 46 to 55 cents an hour. The members of the union returned to work at the 45-cent rate, but the matter is to be decided definitely in the near future.
