MISS SARAH EMMA GAST

Miss Sarah Emma Gast, of West College Avenue, State College, died at her home at 6:20 o'clock Saturday morning after a two years' illness. Born at Jacksonville on September 10, 1876, she was aged 61 years, 11 months and 3 days. She was a daughter of Charles A. and Margaret Beck Gast. Surviving are two sisters, Carrie M. and Nannie B., both of State College. Deceased was a member of the Presbyterian church and of the Rebekah lodge. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the home, in charge of the Rev. Edward H. Jones, assisted by the Rev. Samuel Martin. Interment was made in the Pine Hill cemetery.

JOHN J. McCracken

John J. McCracken, former guard at Rockview penitentiary, passed away at his home in Wilkensburg at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, after a brief illness with a complication of diseases. After having served as guard at Rockview since the construction of the local prison in 1915, Mr. McCracken was retired last year. For some time he and his wife lived in Bellefonte, residing for a time in the Parrish apartments, and later at the Markland Hotel. The sole survivor in the immediate family is his wife, the former Mary Majors, of Pittsburgh. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning in Wilkensburg, with interment in that city.

MRS. WILLIAM B. COX

Mrs. Anna Mary Cox, 75, wife of the Rev. William B. Cox, of Lewisburg, who served the Evangelical church two terms as superintendent of the Williamsport District, and who was at one time pastor of the Bellefonte church, died last Wednesday morning at the Evangelical Hospital near Lewisburg, where she had been a patient since the previous Monday. Mrs. Cox had been a sufferer with angina pectoris. Deceased was a member of the Central Pennsylvania Branch Woman's Missionary Society and belonged to the W. C. T. U. at Lewisburg. Surviving are her husband, who is secretary of the Evangelical Hospital, and one-time chaplain of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, two daughters, and six brothers and sisters. Interment took place Saturday in the Lewisburg cemetery.

HENRY WILLIAM SAGE

Henry William Sage, grandson of the late Governor Andrew Gregg Curtin, passed away at his home in Jericho, Long Island, on Friday. He was over 60 years old. Mr. Sage was a son of the late William H. Sage and Curtin Sage and is survived by his wife, the former Marjorie Lowrie; two sons, Henry W. Sage, Jr., of New York City, and DeWitt Sage, of Glyndon, Maryland, and a brother, Andrew Curtin Sage. Deceased was engaged in the lumber business for many years and was formerly interested in sports. He was former president of the National Steeplechase and Hunt Association, and for many years was a director of the New York Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

WILLIAM H. BAIRD

William H. Baird, well known retired farmer, passed away at his home in Pleasant Gap at 4:15 o'clock yesterday morning after a lingering illness with asthma and complications. He had been bedfast since Tuesday of last week, and had lapsed into a coma Monday morning from which he did not awaken. Mr. Baird was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Baird and was born on October 17, 1866, making his age at time of death 71 years and 10 months. About 52 years ago he was united in marriage with Miss Anna Eckenroth, of Bellefonte, who survives with one son, Prof. L. E. Baird, of Mill City. Also surviving are four grandchildren, and two granddaughters, three sisters, namely: Herman Baird, of Mt. Holly Springs; James Baird, of Altoona; Mrs. Sallie Sprankle, Warriors Mark; Mrs. James Fryer, McKeesport, and Mrs. Emma Eckert, of Curwensville. Funeral services will be held at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon from the home in charge of the Rev. W. J. Wertz, of State College, and the Rev. D. D. Kauffman, of Pleasant Gap. Interment will be made in the Pleasant Gap cemetery. Mr. Baird was a farmer practically all of his life and operated his own farm in Penn's Valley until his retirement in 1912. At that time he moved to Pleasant Gap where the family resided until 16 years ago when they moved to Pleasant Gap, which has been their home since that time. He was a member of the Pleasant Gap Lutheran church.

Anniversary of Church Planned

Evangelical Charge of Rebersburg Prepares to Honor Conference Centennial

On September 11, there will be a planned anniversary service for all appointments in the Rebersburg Evangelical church to coincide with the Centennial celebration of the Central Pennsylvania Conference, and the Centennial celebration of the Missionary Society in the General church.

The Reverend Andrew D. Gramley, one of the leading historians of the church, will be the special speaker on this occasion. Motion pictures of the congregations assembling to worship and other activities of the occasion will be preserved in reel, for future celebration of the general centennial. Some worthwhile prizes will be given to the oldest in attendance, the youngest, and the parents having the largest family, etc. Those attending will have the opportunity to register.

The Paradise church was organized about 1831, and a church was erected on the present site. In the old church on March 26, 1839, John Seybert was elected at the seventh General Conference, to become the first Bishop of the church, elected to succeed the founder, Rev. James Albright. This church (Paradise) was formerly known as the Mussler church in honor of Rev. Sebastian Mussler. The first unit of the Rebersburg Evangelical church was built in 1834, and an annual conference was held in this church in 1836. But the work started earlier than that. Albright and Walter, and Driesbach were in Brush Valley and preached at the Christ-opher Spangler house as early as 1805 and 1806, about the time that Spangler completed the building of the house.

Weekly preaching in the homes of the Rebers and Fiedlers at or near Madisonburg was carried on at about the same time. The present structure in which the Madisonburg group worshiped was erected in 1854. The present Paradise or "Mussler" church was built in 1869. Rev. S. Mussler is buried in the cemetery adjoining the church which has borne his name so many years. Thoroughly connected with the work may be found many of his descendants. At that famous Seventh General Conference some very advanced ecclesiastical legislation took place in regard to the growing anti-slavery movements in the North, also in regard to Temperance, and matters of administration of the general church affairs. Before the organization of the Central Pennsylvania Conference there were two conferences known as the East and West Conferences. The annual Conference of 1856 was that of the East Conference and this was held at Rebersburg. Famous campmeeting was held in Brush Valley, and Penn's Valley. Christopher Spangler was leader of the Evangelical class in Brush Valley. It was through this valley that the work spread to Sugar Valley and beyond.

Congressman Gingery Speaks at Legion Picnic

Congressman Don Gingery was the guest speaker at the American Legion Picnic held at Reservoir Park at Tyrone, last week. During the course of his remarks Mr. Gingery brought to the attention of the Legionnaires and their friends that he has consistently supported and voted for veterans' legislation since being elected to Congress, including the Bonus, restoration of Spanish American War Veterans' pensions, increasing Spanish American War Veterans' pensions from \$30.00 to \$60.00 a month on reaching the age of 65, liberalization of benefits to World War Veterans and dependents under Public Law No. 304, \$25,000,000 for increasing facilities in veterans' hospitals, liberalization of service connection requirements under public law 648, increasing pensions for non-service connected cases from \$20 to \$40 a month and other laws of distinct benefit to the veterans and their dependents. Congressman Gingery has been active in behalf of the veterans, and has been of assistance to over 1500 veterans and their dependents during the two terms he has served as a Representative in Congress.

The players in the band numbered 73 and 4 guest artists assisted in the concert, which was made up of banjo and guitar selections, tap dance numbers and vocal trio selections. This Thursday evening the band will parade at the Howard Homecoming, Thursday, August 25 carried out at Bellefonte, Saturday, September 3, carnival at Bellefonte. Other dates pending.

300 WOMEN ATTEND DEMOCRATIC OUTING

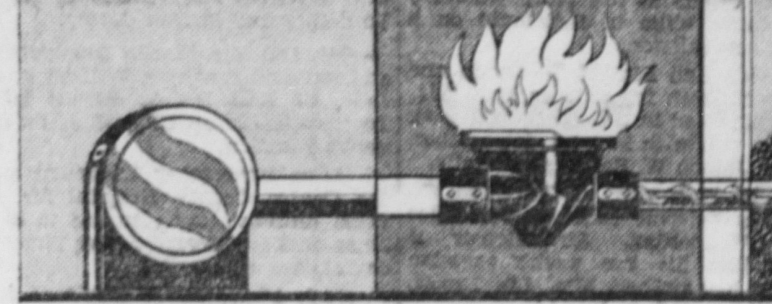
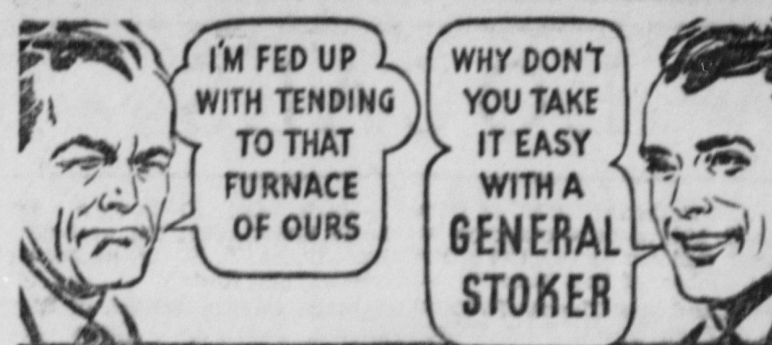
