

# Over The County News

Earl Ross, a Potter township progressive farmer, secured a number of Hereford steers for feeding for the spring market. The steers are said to be a fine lot.

Farmer Frank P. Floray, near Tusseyville, has been confined to an easy chair since the latter part of July when he fell from the rear end of a load of oats. He is unable to lie in bed and suffers considerably for much of the time.

Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Klingler, living on one of the Crossman farms, owned by them in Potter township, are both in very serious physical condition, having suffered light strokes. Mrs. Klingler is able to sit on the porch, but is scarcely conscious of her surroundings. Mr. Klingler is out of bed part of the time against the orders of the family physician.

Paul Boone, eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Boone, of Millheim, was taken to the Phillipsburg State Hospital last Thursday for surgical treatment. The lad, handicapped since infancy by a shortened leg was operated upon for the purpose of having the leg grow normally. At this time he is reported to be getting along nicely with some measure of success, although the process is very painful.

The new building for grade schools being erected at Lemont by College township will be constructed of native limestone and trimmed with Indiana limestone. The building will be L-shaped and each of the wings will have four rooms. The entrance will be toward the east, where the right angle will be flattened out to accommodate it. The approximate cost of the structure is \$90,000, a grant of \$61,588 having been made by the Federal Government.

Like any other day during the thirty-five years he followed the plastering trade, Daniel H. Siegal, of Spring Mills, on the seventy-fourth anniversary of his birth, put in a full day on a plastering job at State College. It was the manner in which he delighted to celebrate the event, which occurred on Thursday, August 11. Mr. Siegal is well preserved and working at this time is not a hardship. He has long lived at Spring Mills and is one of the town's progressive citizens.

Plans for the building of Route 222 between Yeagerstown and Reedsville in Manlius Narrows call for a change in the grade crossing of the Pennsylvania Railroad company at the Reedsville station. A hearing before Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission to secure approval of this change and determine the allocation of the costs of the change was held at Harrisburg on August 10.

Miss Mary Segner of Boalsburg, employed in the Centre Hall telephone exchange on part time, will become night operator in the new dormitory at Penn State College about the first of September. Miss Segner was an operator in the Bell exchange prior to the change in the introduction of the dial system at State College and Boalsburg, after which time she was transferred to Centre Hall.

The building of a school house at Woodward for grade school pupils is giving employment for two men from Centre Hall, two from Pottery Mills and one from Spring Mills. Joseph H. and Dean H. Wagner, both from Centre Hall, Fred Royer and Harry Foust from Pottery Mills, carpenters, and Elmer Kifer, Spring Mills, are the men employed. The building is a WPA project, and is making rapid progress.

The West Penn Power company is making preparations to install a larger transformer to take care of the increased load occasioned by the Grange Fair Association's extension of their lighting system on the park. The West Penn's high voltage line carries 22,000 volts, which voltage is reduced to 2200 through its transformer. The task of replacing the present with a larger transformer entails a great amount of labor.

Glenn Peters, of North Thomas street, Bellefonte, while swimming in the pool above Pleasant Gap last Tuesday afternoon, sustained a laceration of the foot which required several stitches to close. The youth with a number of his companions were sporting in the artificial pool above the Gap when he accidentally stepped on a piece of glass. The injury was not considered serious and he was returned to his home after receiving treatment.

Through an appointment in which Centre Hall borough council, the school board and the county commissioners had a hand, Miss Helen Bartholomew was appointed tax collector for Centre Hall. Her appointment is for the unexpired term of her brother, C. D. Bartholomew, who was elected for a four-year term last fall. There were no others to press for the appointment. The appointee is thoroughly familiar with the work of the office and is well able to perform the service.

R. A. "Rex" Gordon, of North Allegheny street, Bellefonte, who is employed by the West Penn Power company as an apprentice lineman, was removed to his home last Tuesday afternoon stricken with what physicians said was a stroke suffered while in the performance of his duties at the substation south of town about 3:30 o'clock. Mr. Gordon complained of not feeling well in the afternoon and after being brought to the office of a local physician, his case was diagnosed as stroke. His condition yesterday was reported a much improved.

teachers in service," according to Dr. Lester K. Ade, Superintendent of Public Instruction. These round-table discussions and general meetings are in addition to courses in education and in subject-matter provided for in institutions of higher learning. The Centre County Institute is scheduled to be held in Bellefonte, Thursday and Friday, October 20 and 21.

According to the modern point of view, the education of teachers in service cannot be effected solely by courses completed in institutions of higher learning. Theory and practice should be combined, each supplementing the other. This is particularly necessary for teachers with less than college education and for teachers relatively inexperienced.

The professional meetings planned for during the coming school year will help in maintaining and building up the professional spirit of teachers in their work. These meetings will give teachers a larger professional outlook and develop solidarity in the teaching profession. In many cases the public-at-large will attend the meetings to consider numbers. The public can be properly informed of such matters in which they are fundamentally interested.

General meetings, at which all the teachers of the school district will assemble, are a part of the program. Teachers will get the inspiration and kindred feelings which come from large gatherings of those who are engaged in the same work. New problems, theories, and practices are constantly arising and these will be presented in such general meetings.

Sectional meetings will be attended by teachers such as art teachers, music teachers, health teachers, junior high school teachers, English teachers and the like. Techniques of teachers in these special fields will be demonstrated and problems of immediate concern to the group discussed. The present changes in school organization and administration included in the many programs which have been arranged.

Members of the Department of Public Instruction, the State Teachers' Colleges, and other institutions of higher learning, make themselves available for the programs, while in many school districts the teachers themselves plan their own demonstrations and provide for their own discussion leaders. Inspirational speakers and prominent personalities engaged in the work of education are invited to address the teachers.
