broadway by the amplifiers. On Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. following the parade of farm machinery, Mr. Joseph Robb will speak on the General Welfare Act, better known as the Townsend Plan. Finals in all classes of the Amateur Contest are scheduled for the Thursday evening September 1st, at the completion of their eliminations. Winning contestants in the different classes will compete for the grand prize.

Baseball games are scheduled for every day, two on Wednesday, with the final playoff on Thursday morning. Their chief rival as an attraction on the program is the Farmer's Hopscotch Pitching Contest on Wednesday and Thursday. Grange Day on Thursday will be celebrated by the parade of Grange floats, at 1:30 p. m. from all Granges in the county. This will be followed by an address by Miles Horst of the Pennsylvania Farmer, an authority on farm conditions in the East. Mr. Horst's address will be well worth listening to. Exhibits from Granges, both subordinate and juvenile, schools, clubs, and individuals must be placed by Tuesday evening, in order that they may be judged Wednesday. Stock exhibits promise to be unusually large in 1938. Boys' and girls' livestock judging contest on Tuesday as well as other 4-H club activities on that day, are eagerly awaited by the youthful club members throughout the county.

In the Horticultural Building, the center lot of exhibits will be entirely filled by an exhibit arranged and placed by the Centre Hall Garden Club. Six classes—dining table arrangements, console table arrangements, coffee table arrangements, floating arrangements, common flowers in common containers, and tall vase arrangements—will be displayed.

velopment of the air field. A modern \$30,000 hangar, capable of housing sixteen planes, has been erected on the field. Three runways with six approaches afford good landing and take-off facilities. One runway is 3100 feet long and the other two are each 2500 feet in length. All three have a width of 500 feet.

Senator Thompson outlined the five purposes of construction for the field and stressed its three natural advantages. The location, he said, were: 1. Airmail pickup. 2. Air taxi service. 3. Location on the famous 'Hell's Acres' course. 4. Intermediary stop. 5. Military use. The natural advantages were described by him as being: 1. Above the fog level. 2. Constructed of shale. 3. Free of snow in the winter and open to traffic.

The Senator was introduced to the assemblage by R. G. Howard. At the conclusion of his address W. H. Cawthra, mayor of the city of DuBois, accepted the port in the name of the city. The two-day aerodeo was participated in by twenty-five professional pilots who performed many thrilling and daring feats.
