Mayo was convicted in the January 1935, session of the court of Clinton County, for the murder of Robert W. Probst, who was on duty the night of August 22, 1934, as a member of the Lock Haven police force. The jury returned a verdict of murder in the first degree, with the recommendation of life imprisonment.

Mayo's application for parole will be opposed, according to Clinton County District Attorney Burritt L. Haag. The man had a criminal record before the murder charge was lodged against him, and at one time escaped from the Mifflin County jail at Lewistown.

Claim County Institution is Outmoded, Outdated; No Remedy Suggested

FIND 22 TRUE BILLS. 9 FOUND NOT TRUE

Costs Placed on Prosecutors in Five Cases in Which Bills Are Ignored

Scoring the Centre County jail as outmoded and outdated, the Grand Jury for the September term of Court, in concluding its deliberations here yesterday, reported to Judge Ivan Walker that the jail is not properly fitted to be used as a house of detention for prisoners.
