HAZARDS OF PLAY WORSE THAN HAZARDS OF WORK

Fatal accidents among the oil workers of the United States during last year were one-third less when on the job than off-duty, according to a report made by the American Petroleum Industries Committee in Rockefeller Center. Fatalities during the year were only forty-six during working hours, as compared with sixty-nine during leisure hours. The committee also reports that traffic accidents accounted for more than half of the off-duty fatalities.

Guns Given to Roosevelt

Two small cannon, modeled the style of the ancient guns used more than 100 years ago and fashioned out of a gun and gun-carriage used during the war of 1812 were presented to President Roosevelt by Kingston, Ont., war veterans during his visit there. The cannons were mounted on a teakwood base and placed within teakwood box made from part of the old gun carriage.
