The structural steel for the new bridge to be erected over Maran Creek just west of Blanchard arrived last week and was hauled to the bridge site in preparation for the start of construction there.

A petition signed by 281 residents of Ovation and Monument has been forwarded to the Public Utility Commission, Harrisburg, asking that service lines of the West Penn Power company be extended to those villages.

The Republican county committee has taken over the old Masonic camp, near Curtin, and will convert it into a club house for all organizations of the party, a place where the Republican women's club, the Young Republican club as well as the older members and the county committee can gather for their confabs.

Mrs. Tessie McClellan, of Centre Hall, was taken to the Lewistown hospital on Thursday of last week and underwent a major operation on Tuesday. Dr. H. C. Cassidy, surgeon, she received a blood transfusion from her sons, Wilbur McClellan and Vinton McClellan, of Lock Haven, immediately prior to the operation which revealed conditions unlooked for. Following the operation a third transfusion was given.

Mrs. Annie Kramer, of the Allison block on North Allegheny Street, Bellefonte, was admitted as a patient in the Centre County Hospital on Saturday morning at 2:30 o'clock suffering from a fracture of the right wrist and severe lacerations of the face said to have been received when she fell from a moving automobile along the Nittany Valley road somewhere between Bellefonte and Hubersburg. The accident was not reported as far as can be learned and the details are meagre.

Carl Moerschbacher, of East High Street, Bellefonte, an employee of the West Penn Power Corporation suffered a severe burn of the right arm at the elbow last Wednesday while spraying power poles with creosote. Mr. Moerschbacher was using one of the spraying machines equipped with a long nozzle when the wind blew the hot liquid and fumes back against him. In dipping into the container to replenish the spray, some of the contents dropped on Moerschbacher's arm inflicting a painful burn. The accident occurred while Moerschbacher was working in the vicinity of Kane. As a result of the accident he is spending the time at his home here.

A new GMC school bus will be used by Henry Glasgow of Coburn to convey Penn township school pupils to the consolidated school at that place. The bus has a capacity of fifty-two passengers. There are seven rows of seats (two to a row) crosswise and one continuous row of seats on either side. All seats and backs are upholstered. The equipment is complete on the interior and the bus as a whole makes a fine appearance. Mr. Glasgow has a three-year contract for hauling pupils, the longest term contract permissible under the school code. There are forty-eight children on the route, the route being thirteen miles in length, one way, making a total haul of fifty-two miles per day.

Clearfield Man Is Killed; Nine Injured

On Thursday night a coroner's jury met at the home of Dr. W. R. Heaton in Philadelphia, and after hearing the evidence, absolved Elmer Frailey, driver of the truck, of contributory negligence.

Five witnesses who were occupants of the truck at the time of the accident, gave testimony which was closely correlated. All stated that the truck was traveling about 25 miles an hour when the accident occurred. Testimony showed that the truck had trailed two cars in front from Black Moshannon, and that Frailey, anxious to get the cars which were traveling very slowly and irregularly, had attempted to pass near the bottom of One Mile Run hill. Testimony proved that the road was in a slippery condition and that the left wheel of the truck went off the road onto the soft berm, turning the truck heavily to the right.

Witnesses stated that in attempting to straighten up the truck it was pulled to the right and then began skidding, finally coming to a stop, turning around completely and then tipping over, throwing the occupants of the truck into a ditch and plunging two under the body.

Elmer Bowman, who was along with William Rowles, was pinned under the truck, testified that the body of the truck rested on Rowles, who died from his injuries.

Testimony given proved that Frailey was not intoxicated and that the question his ability as a driver, it was the first accident he had ever had.

A Philadelphia motor patrolman who investigated the accident said that the point at which the truck passed the two cars was a legitimate passing point and that no highway laws had been broken.
