ARGYRIA

Many drugs are quite safe when used under the directions of a physician, but very unsafe when not properly used. It is quite probable that Mrs. Jones had not the slightest notion what argyrol is composed of, and knew absolutely nothing of its dangers. The woman to whom she passed it on was perhaps equally ignorant and yet between them they were dropping it into eyes and anabing throats with it.

Argyrol is made from silver

Because silver in a pure state is white, it was in ancient times named luna, which is the name for the moon. We speak of silver moon or the silver rays of the moon. The argyrol of silver is called lunar caustic. The ancients believed that the rays of the moon caused insanity. Hence on the theory that "the hair of the dog is good for the bite," it was supposed that silver, the moon's element, would cure lunacy or insanity. Consequently, silver was a remedy in common use for the cure of nervous and mental diseases.

It was observed that some of the patients after months or years of medication with silver lost the natural color of their skins and became ashen in hue or blue. This staining of the skin is argyria. It is due to a deposit of silver in the dermis or deep skin. For many years a blue man made his living in a side show of a circus. He had formerly belonged to the British army and had been treated for some chronic ailment by the prolonged use of silver.

Due to the staining of the skin by the continued use of silver in any form, physicians have become very careful in prescribing silver preparations.

The discoloration of the skin from silver is known as argyria. While it is unpleasant to the possessor of such a skin, the condition does not in any way affect the health.

Do not run to the argyrol bottle and put drops in your child's nose every time you cough. When it goes into his nose and throat a little is almost sure to be swallowed. Continued too long, the patient may lose his rosy color and begin to take on bluish shades. Only recently several cases of argyria have come to the attention of physicians. They are due to the popularity of argyrol as a household remedy and its unsafe use, especially by anxious mothers who are too prone to reach for the argyrol bottle on the slightest suggestions of a cold or sore throat.

When you or a member of your household is sick, you should call your physician. He knows the proper remedy and will consult him and follow his directions, you will save time, suffering and perhaps a life.

Please Autumn Bride

Kitchenware showings are always popular, for they offer an excellent opportunity to give gifts to prospective housewives. Since the gifts can be daily reminders of the givers, choose them with such care that they will be treasured reminders. Think first of the friend who will receive the gift. Says Miss Helen S. Butler, Home Economics Extension Representative of Centre county. Think of her home and the cooking she will be doing.

A few extra minutes spent in selecting a gift may mean the difference between frequent use or storage on the top shelf and occasional use. Find out the friend's preference as far as possible. If there is any doubt about her taste for kitchenware, select a more or less standard utensil that gives little chance for personal difference of opinion. Measuring cups, egg beaters, and rolling pins may come in this class.

A coffee pot is not an easy gift to give unless we are sure of the type our friend prefers. Tastes differ and persons often have a distinct preference for enamel, glass, porcelain coffee, so Miss Butler suggests that we find out the friend's preference or omit coffee pots from our list.

When selecting essential equipment, get the best quality though not always the most expensive. It may be able to give a high quality cover that will fit a standard size kettle, than a pan and lid of poor quality costing the same amount of money.

Before buying utensils in color, find out the color scheme in the bride-to-be's kitchen, then select colors that harmonize or contrast with it. Use judgment in choosing colors, and always remember that brilliant colors are best in small amounts.
