

CHOOSE INSCRIPTION FOR LIBRARY BUILDING PLAQUE

At a meeting of the executive board of the County Library and Historical Corporation at the library building, Monday, the wording of a large bronze plaque to be placed at the front of the building was decided upon.

The form, prepared by J. Thomas Mitchell, head of the Corporation, calls for a plaque 20 by 30 inches in size, bearing the following inscription:

"Ann Elmira Humes Library And Mary Ellen McQuestion Memorial"

The heavy cast bronze tablet will be fitted flush into the masonry of the front wall at a height of approximately 8 or more feet from the sidewalk level. The entire cost of making and placing the plaque will be approximately \$90 it was reported.

School Districts Propose Mergers

(Continued from Page 1)

That several school districts are contemplating the consolidation of their elementary school systems, with the consequent closing of one-room schools. These proposed changes are in line with the Department of Public Instruction's state-wide plan for increasing the size of school units to provide larger and better educational facilities for grade and high school students.

Among the buildings or additions approved by the County Board are the following:

An 11-room addition and double gymnasium for Bellefonte.

An entire new high and grade school for Snow Shoe Borough.

Grade school in Snow Shoe township.

New grade school building for Harris township, at Boalsburg.

6-room addition to Centre Hall school.

Additional facilities at Port Matilda, for borough and Worth township pupils.

A \$685,000 new high school building at State College.

A \$130,000 new wing to the Phillipsburg high school.

Addition to the East Penn's Valley High School, Millheim.

Addition to the grade and high school facilities for Walker township, at Hubersburg.

Walker township school directors are now considering a proposal to close the six one-room schools throughout the district, and to provide grade and high school facilities for the entire district at Hubersburg.

Oregon township, contemplating similar action, may close the seven small schools and provide central facilities for high and grade pupils in the G. T. V. S. location in Spring Mills.

Centre Hall and Potter township are studying the advisability of consolidation. If their plan materializes all high and grade pupils in the borough and township will be transported to the Centre Hall school center.

The plan would mean the closing of seven small grade schools in Potter township.

Rush township, with a system of seven grade schools, is now contemplating a partial consolidation, although plans have not been announced at this time.

Powelton Boy Killed By Truck

State Hospital where he died, twelve hours later from his injuries. He suffered a fractured skull and fractures of the left and right leg.

Motor police said that the youngster had evidently run out on the road from in back of another truck which was proceeding in the opposite direction of Galbraith's truck which was traveling towards Osceola.

Galbraith failed to see the child until it was too late. Tire marks on the highway showed he swerved his truck sharply in an attempt to avoid hitting the child.

To further determine the truck driver's responsibility for the accident, the Phillipsburg motor police used a device known as a tachometer by which they were able to measure the tire marks on the highway. The test showed that the truck driver was not traveling at an excessive speed, and was thereupon absolved from blame.

Keith was struck at almost the same spot as when Bryan, 3, Sandy Ridge, who was hit by a truck September 13, and is still in the hospital recuperating from his injuries.

Harold Keith was born in Birmingham, August 22, 1929, a son of Harry and Mae Miller Keith. He is survived by his parents and the following brothers and sisters: Harry, Edmond, Glenn, Doris, Cleo and Lona, all at home.

Funeral services were held at the home Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Reverend Merrill Cowfer, Birmingham, officiated at the services.

Keith's death marks the 20th fatality on Centre-Clearfield county roads this year.
