Sunday School Lesson

SPIRITUAL WORSHIP.

International Sunday School Lesson for October 9th, 1938

GOLDEN TEXT: "God is a Spirit; and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and truth."—John 4:24.

Last week, we considered the First Commandment, which forbids polytheism—the worship of many gods—and commands the worship of Jehovah, the one true God. It isn't easy for us to think back to the time when these commandments were given to the Hebrew people.

Not only was the worship of God to be exclusive, it was to be spiritual. They were not only forbidden to worship the one true God in false forms. The Second Commandment forbids the making, erecting or worshipping of "graven images." We interpret this Commandment as forbidding the development of art or sculpture, the real meaning is that these figures, or images, are not to be carved or "graven" for the purpose of being worshipped.

It might be worthwhile, in this connection, to point out that the reverent, sincere worship of God tends to lift a human being higher while the opposite is true in the case of the idol-worshiper. Some one has explained this by the thought that the god of the heathen is lower than the worshiper himself, and consequently, drags him farther and farther down.

SOCIALIZED MEDICINE.

PENN STATE ENROLLMENT REACHES ALL-TIME HIGH

The Pennsylvania State College has reached its all-time first semester high mark in student enrollment. William S. Hoffman, registrar, reported to President Ralph D. Hetzel, that 6,784 students were registered in the college. Last year, on Oct. 12, the number registered was 6,345. This year's enrollment is 439 more than the enrollment during the first semester of last year and is but 22 less than the gross enrollment for the entire 1937-38 academic year.

Among the students registered are 422 graduate students who are taking programs of advanced study, 1,238 seniors, 1,331 juniors, 1,616 sophomores and 1,803 freshmen, as well as 182 two-year students and 182 special students.

The total number of students enrolled on the campus is 6,176. In addition to this group are 41 education students who are doing practice teaching at Johnstown, 137 enrolled in the first year of the forestry curriculum at Mont Alto, and 430 students registered in the undergraduate centers maintained at Uniontown, DuBois, Academic, and Pottsville.

The total enrollment of the undergraduate centers is an increase of 83 over their gross enrollment for the 1937-38 academic year. Mr. Hoffman said.

Answers to Modern Etiquette

Lemon Cocktail Sauce for Fruit

Apple and Orange Betty

Oranges and lemons are valuable and necessary parts of the well-balanced diet. Through the use of them we get the protective food element in a most appetizing way. They fit into any part of a meal from cocktail through the dessert.

Bitter Orange Marmalade

1 grapefruit. 2 oranges. 1/2 cup brown sugar. 1/2 tsp. lemon salt. 1/2 lb. macaroon. Butter. Slice apples and remove orange sections. Arrange a layer of apple and a layer of oranges in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle with brown sugar and a little salt, then add 1/2 cup of crushed macaroon and dot with bits of butter. Repeat the process until all the ingredients are used. Bake in an oven 375 degrees about 25 minutes or until the apples are tender. Serve hot or cold with whipped cream or hard sauce.

Baked Oranges

6 oranges. 3 cups sugar. 2 tablespoons melted butter. Simmer oranges gently in water to cover until tender, 2 or 3 hours. Cut crosswise into halves and arrange in baking dish, then pour over them a syrup made by boiling together for 5 minutes the sugar with a cupful of the water in which the oranges were cooked. Put a teaspoon of butter on each, cover and bake until clear, basting occasionally with the syrup in the dish. Serve hot or cold with baked ham, lamb, pork or roast hen.

Harlequin Dessert Salad

Halve large seedless oranges crosswise. Remove pulp and dice. Mix with equal quantity of diced pineapple, quartered marshmallows, shredded almonds and bananas. Marinate with salad dressing to which you have added 1/2 cup of maraschino cherries, cut in quarters, and 1 cup of whipped cream. Fill the orange slices and garnish with whole raisins. Serve on lettuce.

Orange Salad

Allow 1 orange for each serving. Peel and segment fruit. Arrange segments on lettuce. Garnish with stuffed olives or pimiento strips. Serve with French dressing to which a dash of catsup has been added.

Orange Layer Cake

4 tablespoons shortening. 1 cup sugar. 2 eggs. 1 1/2 cup flour. 2 teaspoons baking powder. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 cup orange juice. Cream fat and sugar. Add beaten egg yolks. Mix well. Sift dry ingredients together. Add flour alternately with orange juice. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in 2 layers in an oven 375 degrees for 15 or 20 minutes. Put together with orange filling and frost with orange frosting. Decorate with segments of orange.

Orange Filling

1 egg beaten. 3 tablespoons cornstarch. 1/2 cup water. 1/2 cup orange juice. 1/2 teaspoon double orange rind. Mix well. Cook in double boiler 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Add 1 tablespoon butter. Cool before spreading on cake.

Orange Frosting

1 teaspoon white corn syrup. 1/2 cup of sugar. 1/4 teaspoon grated orange rind. 1 egg white. 3 tablespoons orange juice. Put in double boiler, beat constantly over boiling water 6 to 8 minutes. Remove from heat, add 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice and a sprinkle of salt. Beat thoroughly and spread on cake.

Fruit Cup

1 cup orange segments. 1/2 cup orange juice. 1 cup long, slender, red skinned apple pieces, unpeeled. 1/2 cup shredded dates. 2 tablespoons lemon juice. 2 tablespoons sugar. Combine ingredients and serve very cold.
