The school will be conducted by Miss Marian Marshall, home economist for the Westinghouse Electric Company. The meter test in conjunction with the school is a feature of the local observance of District Month among Westinghouse dealers in which an effort will be made to acquaint the public with the surprisingly low cost of electric range operation.
