At an early age his parents moved to Centre county, where he continuously resided until he moved to Clearfield in 1928. During his residence in Bellefonte he was employed as a conductor on the Pennsylvania Railroad until he met with an accident in the vicinity of the old Valentine Furnace, about thirty-five years ago, which resulted in the loss of both legs. On February 15, 1881, he was united in marriage to Elizabeth E. Kelley, who preceded him in death 13 years ago. To this union five children were born, of whom the following survive: Edward A. MANY MEMORABLE DATES IN OCTOBER

Scattered through the 31 days of October are the anniversaries of four Presidents of the United States. Rutherford B. Hayes, born on October 4; Chester A. Arthur, born on October 5; Theodore Roosevelt, born on October 27; and John Adams born on October 30, are the four who were Presidents of the United States.
