

Second Youth Held in Thefts

Eugene Page, Charged With Receiving Money Stolen From Hess Store

In charges resulting from recent thefts from the Clifford Hess grocery on South Water Street, Eugene Page, 18, of the Keystone apartments, Bellefonte, is under \$500 bail for his appearance in court.

Page is charged with receiving stolen goods from Arthur Bickie, 19, of South Water Street, who last week was jailed on charges of committing the thefts.

According to Chief of Police Harry Dukeman and Officer Donald Johnson, of the Borough police who made both arrests, a complete checkup at the Hess store reveals that the total amount taken was slightly more than \$200. Last week it was reported the total loot was in excess of \$500.

Police claim that Page received money from Bickie, and that he assisted in disposing of the cash. After questioning, Friday afternoon, Page is reported to have admitted his guilt and led police to the now abandoned limestone quarry in Armon Gap, where he scaled the almost vertical abandoned knif for a distance of about 25 feet, reached into a recess, and returned to the ground with a beer can, in which officers found \$25.

Library Group Studies Finances

Organization Hears Helpful Addresses by Well Known Librarians

Addresses by three persons of wide experience in library work, and a complete financial report of the Library and Historical Corporation occupied members of the organization at a public meeting held Tuesday afternoon in the Library building, corner of Allegheny and Howard streets.

Dr. Joseph L. Rafter, director of the state library and museum at Harrisburg; W. P. Lewis, director of the Penn State College library, and Miss Catherine Roberts, Huntingdon County librarian, gave members of the local group a comprehensive review of what steps must be taken to establish the local library on a sound and thriving basis.

At a business session over which Mrs. Elizabeth Beach, president of the board, presided, Mrs. E. E. Widowson, president of the Bellefonte Woman's Club, was named a member of the board of directors. Mrs. Samuel Waite is secretary of the board.

A financial report read by John S. Sommerville, showed the following receipts: Mrs. Beach, \$16.00; Woman's Club, \$67.52; D. A. R., \$50; Mrs. John G. Love, \$50; sale of scrap, \$10; G. R. Meek, executor, McQuiston fund, \$229.52; sale of scrap, \$20.65; rentals, \$356.25, or a total of \$1,496.03.

Expenditures were: janitor, \$183.75; fuel, \$53.73; plumbing and heating, \$503.51; supplies, \$117.25; salary of secretary, \$40; insurance, \$64.43; light, \$6.20; stationery, \$1; and balance in bank, \$436.16, or a total of \$1,406.03.

The report also showed anticipated revenues for the coming year at \$541.26 from the McQuiston fund, and \$510 from rentals, or a total of \$1,051.26.

Girl Freed In Shooting Affair

Squire Dismisses Case For Lack of Evidence; Victim Has Scalp Wound

Ernestine Lytle, a 22-year-old Stormstown girl, charged with assault and battery with intent to kill after she allegedly fired a shot which struck Kenneth Campbell, aged 23, of State College, was released from custody Friday afternoon after a hearing before Justice of the Peace Eugene Lederer, of State College. Squire Lederer dismissed the case for lack of evidence.

According to Private W. C. Myers, of the Rockview substation State Motor Police, and Sheriff Harry V. Keeler, who arrested Miss Lytle about 2 o'clock last Thursday afternoon while she was attending a funeral service at the Baptist church in Stormstown, the girl is reported to have fired a shot that struck Campbell, her erstwhile lover, in the head. The bullet struck above the right ear but did not penetrate the skull.

The shooting is said to have taken place in Miss Lytle's bedroom at her parental home in Stormstown about 6:30 o'clock Tuesday evening of last week. Campbell went about with the bullet in his scalp until the following day when he reported the matter to police. He appeared at the hearing Saturday, apparently unharmed by the wound. Physicians who examined him decided not to attempt to remove the slug, which had been fired from a .22-caliber revolver.
