In charges resulting from recent thefts from the Clifford Hess grocery on South Water Street, Eugene Page, 18, of the Keystone apartments Bellefonte, is under \$500 bail for his appearance in Court.

Page is charged with receiving stolen goods from Arthur Bickle, 19, of South Water Street, who last week was jailed on charges of committing the therts

According to Cifief of Police Harry Dukeman and Officer Donald Johnson, of the Borough police who made both arrests, a complete checkup at the Hess store reveals that the total amount taken was slightly more than \$200. Last week it was reported the total loot was in excess of \$500.

Police claim that Page received money from Bickle, and that he assisted in disposing of the cash. After questioning, Friday afternoon, Page is reported to have admitted his guilt and led police to the now abandoned limestone quarry in Armor Gap, where he scaled the almost vertical abandoned kaln for a distance of about 25 feet, reached into a recess, and returned to the ground with a beer can, in which officers found

This money, together with \$20 found in Bickle's possession at the time of his arrest, has been returned to the Hess store. Bickle, in a statement to police, said he spent the remainder of the money in poolrooms, in entertaining girls, and in a general way. He made no estimate of the amount spent in this manner.


