P. R. R. ORDERS 25 LARGER TENDERS

In order to increase the general efficiency of its locomotives in both freight and passenger trains, the board of directors of the Pennsylvania Railroad has authorized the construction of twenty-five new 21,000-gallon tenders for operation with locomotives of the powerful M-1 type in the through freight service.

The twenty-five new tenders, which will cost approximately \$550,000, will be built by the railroad's own forces at its Altoona Works. Construction will be started in the near future and the building program will be pushed to completion as rapidly as practicable.

RAM TRUCK IS USED IN FLOCK IMPROVEMENT

A ram truck, used for the first time in the medium wool section of Pennsylvania, distributed 20 purebred rams to farmers in seven northwestern counties, reports W. B. Connel, in charge of livestock extension for the Pennsylvania State College.

Six breeders considered the rams which were of the Oxford, Hampshire and Shropshire breeds. The

tour of the ram truck was sponsored by the cooperative sheep and wool growers' associations of Butler, Crawford, Erie, Lawrence, Mercer, Venango and Warren counties. The average sale price for the rams distributed for flock improvement was \$25.

An educational meeting at each of the seven stops emphasized the finishing of lambs for market. Grading of market lambs was demonstrated.
