An exhibit attached to the legal notice served upon Former Judge Furst shows that Mr. Wasson and Mr. Anderson, who is there described as "the only known relative of said General Patton," signed an agree-ment permitting the V. F. W. to remove the body in consideration of the General receiving all these years a proper sepulcher. The witnesses to both signatures, according to the exhibit, was "E. L. Harpster, J. of P.," presumably the Edward L. Harpster who is otherwise active in the matter.

Local historians familiar with General Patton's family and background contend that it was always his wish that he be buried on his own lands. Some members of Bellefonte Chapter. Daughters of the American Revolution have expressed considerable interest in the matter because of the fact that General Patton was one of the early iron masters in Centre county, and because for the past number of years the grave of General Patton has been decorated on Memorial Day by members of the Chapter, in keeping with their custom of honoring soldiers of the Revolution.

And there the matter stands. General Patton was born in Sligo, Ireland, in 1745 and came to Philadelphia in 1761. In 1792 he came to Centre county with the late Col. Samuel Miles and opened the first iron furnace at Centre Furnace. He also bought vast tracts of land in the county. General Patton died in 1804. He was a member of General Washington's body guard, 1st City Troop, of Philadelphia, and Order of Cincinnati. June 13th, 1931, the Bellefonte Chapter D. A. R. erected a monument in the Branch cemetery to General Patton and other Revolutionary soldiers buried in this community. Other descendants of General Patton include Miss Alice Irvin Thompson, Centre Furnace; eph Patton, Media; John Patton, Westgrove, and Mrs. Thomas Stanle, of Ferguson township.
