-\$3,000,000 Contract.
-The British Air Ministry has awarded a contract to the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation at Los Angeles, for \$3,000,000 worth of spare parts for military aircraft. This is the largest order for extra equipment that this company has ever received. This order complements that received by the company last June from the British Government for 200 reconnaissance bombers costing approximately \$18,000,000.
